Order Automatic Gates at Waukegan Crossing

The Chicago, North Shore and Milwaukee railroad has been directed to install two crossing gates with sidewalk arms to provide full 24-hour protection at the Ridgeland avenue crossing in the city of Waukegan, Lake county. This protection will be in substitution for manually operated crossing gates now protecting highway traffic over the crossing.

With a view of the safety of school children the commission ordered the railroad to maintain a flagman at the crossing as additional protection from 8 a.m., until 4 p.m. daily on days when school is in session.

The change in service has been approved by the city council of Waukegan.

"The world's greatest fighting machine" will go into action at the Oak Terrace school auditorium tonight. They will be camped there two days before moving to the front. Since the troops arrived the first of the week, temporary barracks have been erected, streets marked out, cook shack put up, in fact an entire camp has been erected.

Observation platforms have been built within sight of the fighting lines so spectators may view the maneuvers from a safe distance. Passes to cross the guard lines and enter the camp are being issued at Laegeler's Drug Store. Passes are limited and first come will be first served.

The government assumes no responsibility for accidents. Persons entering the contested territory do so at their own risk. A complete corps of Red Cross nurses travel with the army, however, and will give first aid if needed. Visitors will be shown how an army functions, giving them an insight into camp life. Captain Weiss told us Wednesday that a squad of volunteers from Highwood had joined them since camp opened. These rookies, including many prominent business men, are being trained by Top Sergeant Gus Klemp, who has seen service in North America, South America, Europe and Fort Sheridan.

These new rookies are now in camp and relatives and friends will be allowed to watch them being drilled. Camp will be open to visitors from 8 to 1 p.m. tonight and Friday night.

New Stamps Issued for Geo. Washington Bicentennial Period

Commemorating the George Washington bicentennial, 12 new postage stamps in denominations between one-half to 10 cents have been placed on sale in all post offices. All are attractively embossed with the likeness of the first president.

The stamps are of the following colors: One-half cent, dark brown; one cent, green; one and one-half cent, light brown; two cent, red; three cent, purple; four cent, brown; five cent, blue; six cent, orange; seven cent, black; eight cent, olive green; nine cent, pink; and ten cent, orange.

Each embossed likeness of Washington appearing on stamps of the bicentennial issue was taken from paintings done by noted artists of early days.
