## Plane Manufactured in County Is To Be Tested Soon, Report

The maiden flight of the first airplane to be commercially manufactured in Lake county is expected soon. The tests will be made to determine the air-worthiness of the plane, a new type manufactured by the Aeronautical corporation of Barrington.

The motor of the new ship is also of a radically new design, and has been thoroughly tested. It was recently installed in the airplane.

The date of the first trial flight of the ship has not been announced as officials of the company are awaiting for ideal flying weather.

## Sheriff's Bill Are Approved by Board

Bills presented by Sheriff Lester Tiffany for mileage expenses were upheld by a unanimous vote of the board of supervisors in its final session last week, after one of the supervisors had questioned the legal right of the board to approve them.

The sheriff had made two claims, for \$1,354.33 and \$3,510, against the county for serving subpoenas in the Waukegan State bank investigation and for the trial to be held Jan. 18, at Woodstock, for transporting convicted prisoners to the various penal institutions and for returning persons facing criminal charges here from other sections of the country.

## Case Against Auditor Nelson Is Dismissed by Judge Shurtleff

State Auditor Oscar Nelson on Monday was dismissed by Judge Edward D. Shurtleff at Woodstock on a charge of misfeasance in office in connection with the failure of the Waukegan State bank for lack of jurisdiction.

Immediately State's Attorney A. V. Smith took new steps in preparation for the conspiracy charge against Nelson, George Woodruff, Chicago banker, and Norman Q. Geyer, president of the defunct Waukegan bank, set for trial at Woodstock on Jan. 18.

That the enrollment of the Waukegan public grade schools is 4554, and that the percent of attendance is 95.49 was the text of the report made to the city school board at its monthly meeting last week.

## Sheriff's Office in Year's Report Shows Law Well Enforced

During the past year, marked by banditry and general law disregard in many sections of the country, Lake county fared well, according to the report of Sheriff Lester Tiffany's law enforcement activities.

The first year in office ended in December with a record of safe policing of county highways and homes by the sheriff's patrol squads, the seizure of several large distilleries and the apprehension of state prohibition law violators.

Aside from the policing of the county, the sheriff's deputies were swamped with various duties generally connected with the office of the sheriff. The county jail was remodeled and 27 new bunks were installed, increasing the capacity of the jail from 50 to 100 prisoners.

A ventilating system was installed, one ventilator on each floor and on the roof of the jail building. The interior of the jail was painted.

Other repairs and changes were completed in the jail during the past year, making the jail a model for sanitation.

During the year 1,942 county and municipal prisoners were booked in and out of the jail—most of these miscreants were arrested by the sheriff and his deputies. In addition to these, 174 federal prisoners have been booked in and out.

The sheriff and his men served 176 criminal capias during the year, 675 state warrants and 307 grand jury subpoenas, in addition to making the regular calls for petit jurors for the circuit, county and probate courts.

## Waukegan Dog Follows His Master to Jail

Sport, a black-and-white terrier, went to jail last week for the man he loved, says a Waukegan paper. And Sport remained in the cell until his master, George Zewe, 27, of 340 South Jackson street, Waukegan, was discharged in police court the next day, the report says. Leaping for joy, the dog followed his master out of the police station and to their home.

When officers arrested Zewe, Sport was puzzled, but he followed the squad car to the station. When Zewe was locked up, Sport howled outside the cell until the friendly officers allowed him in.

## Waukegan Barbers Not to Cut Price; Is Already Lower

Although barbers throughout Chicago have announced that the price of haircuts and shaves in union shops will be reduced, tonsorial prices in Waukegan, always lower than the Chicago scale, will remain at their present levels.

In Chicago, haircuts formerly costing \$.75 will cost \$.50 after the first of the year, and the shaves, now costing \$.35, will cost \$.25. The the Waukegan prices are \$.60 for a haircut and \$.25 for a shave, excepting on Saturdays when the price of haircuts raises to \$.75.
