With Program; Mr. Smith Tells of Early Days

Thirty years at Elm Place school in Highland Park, the service of Jesse Lowe Smith, was celebrated last Wednesday, when the Parent-Teacher association convened in the kindergarten building to hear Mr. Smith make interesting comparisons

The wide strap on a handle, used for punishment, found in the basement had no place in Mr. Smith's policies. Geography was taught from a book that had answers to the questions and there was no necessity to look at another book or map to learn facts. This type of study of geography became obsolete when Miss Guiney came and took the pupils through the ravines on the school grounds to learn the reasons for the formations. "The best school have no books," Plato and Aristotle used none.

"Child-Centered" School

Mr. Smith discussed the "Child centered school," as it exists Elm Place school.

From the time of McGuffey's Readers when words of two letters such as, "It is an ox," was the introduction of the child to literature, down through the days of "The Little Red Hen" to "The Ginger Bread Boy," Mr. Smith led his hearers, stressing the word "unpredictable"
