SCOUTERS BADGE**

Herewith is pictured the Scouters badge (actual size) which is worn by all Scout leaders at all times. This includes scoutmasters, assistant scoutmasters, commissioners, their assistants, all district committeemen and all troop committee and all the executive board members. This badge is a symbol of scouting with three parts of the trefoil representing the three parts of the Scout law which states:
On my honor I will do my best—
1. To do my duty to God and my country, and to obey the Scout law.
2. To help other people at all times.
3. To keep myself physically strong, mentally awake and morally straight.

This has particular significance at this time because of the twenty-second Anniversary week from Feb. 7 to 13 and every Scouter is urged to wear this badge, especially at this time.
