# Cook County Auto Death Rate Grows 50 Percent in 1931

Deaths from automobile accidents increased more than 50 per cent in 1931 according to figures compiled for Cook county and seven surrounding suburban counties.

Lake county had 88 deaths traceable to autos last year which gives it a ratio of 84.61 deaths for each 100,000 in population, as the last census gave Lake county 104,000. This is the highest ratio for the entire suburban district with the second closest county, Lake in Indiana, having 78 deaths per 100,000 residents.

Cook county, with its 3,982,000 people, had 32.83 deaths per 100,000 while the suburban area with the two Lake counties, DuPage, McHenry, Kankakee, Kendall and Will, showed a 53.75 rate.

Lake county has shown a steady increase in deaths. In 1929 there were 45, and in 1930 there were 57. The table for the district is as follows:

# Re-elect Rosenthal State Builders Head

Oscar W. Rosenthal of Chicago, was re-elected as president of the Illinois Builders league at the annual closing session of the convention of that association at the Hotel Sherman in Chicago recently. Oscar Sandstrom of Waukegan was elected as member of the board of directors. Rosenthal, who has given addresses at several meetings in Lake county has conferred many times with officials of the Associated Builders of Lake county, has a wide circle of acquaintances here.

Plans are about complete contemplating opening of Waukegan's two closed banks as a single state institution under the title of Citizen's Bank and Trust Co. A half million dollars apportioned as capital, surplus and undivided profits will constitute the financial structure.

Application for a state bank charter, signed by 15 prominent Waukegan citizens will be made Monday or Tuesday, whereupon detailed information will be given the public.

The new bank will be a sound, adequately financed institution, its principal stockholders comprised of Waukegan and North Chicago industries.

### Advantages

1. Only members may reserve time in advance. This insures playing at the time desired without waiting.
2. Women members are eligible for the Tee club, Sunset Valley's ladies' organization, which offers many delightful golfing and social events for the ladies.
3. Tuesday is Guest day at the club. Members' guests may register and play at special reduced rates.
4. Definite playing time for the Tee club events has been arranged by reserving Tuesday mornings from 8:30 to 11:00, during which time only women may start from the first tee.
5. So that the course will not be congested during the only hours when many business men are able to start, that is, from 1 to 3 p.m., on Saturdays and before 11 a.m. on Sundays and holidays, play will be restricted to men during these periods.
6. There is a restricted number of special memberships open to players who are not residents of Highland Park. These memberships will enable non-residents to play this fine course at far less than daily fee cost. Non-resident members have exactly the same rights and privileges as resident members.
7. Arrangements are being made for group instruction of men, women and children members, which will enable them to improve their games with expert instruction at minimum cost.
