Cook County Auto Death Rate Grows 50 Percent in 1931

Deaths from automobile accidents increased more than 50 per cent in 1931 according to figures compiled for Cook county and seven surrounding suburban counties.

Lake county had 88 deaths traceable to autos last year which gives it a ratio of 84.61 deaths for each 100,000 in population, as the last census gave Lake county 104,000. This is the highest ratio for the entire suburban district with the second closest county, Lake in Indiana, having 78 deaths per 100,-000 residents.
