Plan Reorganization Of Barrington Bank

Reorganization of the First State bank of Barrington, which suspended business recently on the volition of its directorate, seemed very likely it was reported as prominent business leaders, and civic clubs lent moral and financial support to such a program, according to a Waukegan newspaper.

Any plan for the reopening of the bank will be withheld until the inventory of the institution can be completed by the state auditor's office.

Deposits at the time of closing were approximately \$330,000 but there is \$175,000 in capital, surplus and undivided profits to be placed against this debt without considering monies due to business conditions.

AWARD KNOX TROPHY AT FORT SHERIDAN

Battery D., Second Battalion Is Winner; Medal Goes to Sergt. Pearce

Formal presentation was made at Fort Sheridan, Saturday, Feb. 6th, of the Knox trophy, which is awarded annually to the battery of field artillery of the regular army showing the highest state of efficiency as determined by a competitive test. The winner of the trophy this year is Battery D, 2d Battalion, 3d U. S. Field Artillery, stationed at Fort Sheridan. The presentation of the trophy was made by Major Frank Parker, commanding the sixth corps area. The event was the occasion of an interesting military ceremony, for which all troops of Fort Sheridan assembled. The exercises was held at the post riding hall, at 9:00 o'clock a.m.

At the same ceremony occurred the presentation of the much-sought-for Knox medal to Sergeant Clifton J. Pierce, Headquarters Battery, 2d Battalion, 3d Field Artillery, as the outstanding student in 1931 at the army's field artillery school at Fort Sill, Oklahoma. Both of these prizes have this year been won by the 2d Battalion at Fort Sheridan, a notable achievement, since the competition for them includes all field artillery organizations in the regular army.

Named for Gen. Knox

The trophy and medal are named in honor of Major General Henry Knox, of Revolutionary War fame, who was America's first chief of field artillery and later was Secretary of War under George Washington. The trophy and medal are awarded annually by the Society of the Sons of the Revolution in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. Colonel William H. Burt, chief of staff of the sixth corps area, who is a member of the Massachusetts chapter of the Sons of the Revolution, represented the society and delivered the trophy and medal on behalf of the donors.

All of the 80 batteries of the regular army, including batteries in Panama and Hawaii, were represented in the test for the Knox trophy. Battery D took its test at Camp McCoy, Sparta, Wis., during the summer training camp there last summer. The battery was commanded at the time by Captain Ernest T. Hayes, who has since been transferred to the 13th Field Artillery, in Hawaii.
