### Organizing Stratton Loyalty Club Plan at Libertyville, Report

Announcement of plans for organizing a William J. Stratton Loyalty club were announced last week by Harry M. Bartlett and Charles C. Hoskins of Libertyville following the establishment of headquarters in the Public Service building at Libertyville.

The club, which will be a permanent organization, is organized to accentuate the movement of William J. Stratton of Lake county for secretary of state, and has the backing of many prominent political organizations throughout the county.

The organizers of the club, Harry M. Bartlett, who was the campaign manager of Warren Wright, for state treasurer in 1929, and Justice of the Peace Charles C. Hoskins, who was prominently mentioned as a candidate for the state legislature, both reside in Libertyville. The club plans an intensive campaign for the reelection of Mr. Stratton as secretary of state, to which office he was elected in 1929 by a large majority.
