Calls from outside the office average only six a week and of these, only about one out of six brings the worker more than one dollar each. Therefore relief is being given in created work, paid for in food orders or other family needs. No money being given.

The woodpile continues to furnish employment for the greatest number. Wood sold to date has brought in \$700. Besides this 18 tons have been given out to families where the father is unable to work for it and 67 tons have been delivered to men who have worked on the woodpile 21/2 days for each ton. Wood is for sale, cut in any desired length and delivered at \$10 a cord, \$6 a ton.
