800 MEN ASK FOR \$27,000.00

A small army of men consisting of 130 teams of one captain and five men to the team will meet at New Trier high school on Friday, Feb. 19, for a "Kick-off" dinner meeting, presided over by R. Arthur Wood, general chairman of the campaign.

List of past and prospective contributors have been carefully gone over and after the dinner meeting, each district will pass out its prospect cards to its workers, and the next morning set out bright and early to make its intensive canvass.

Score boards, showing the progress of each team in the district, will be placed in prominent store windows in each district, and the preceding day's results posted each morning. By this means, the public and the workers will have up-to-theminute information on hand each day.

Twenty of the district finance chairmen and their assistants met in Highland Park Sunday afternoon to check progress, and complete plans for the Friday evening "Kickoff" dinner. These men expressed confidence in the prompt completion of the campaign, due to the favorable opinion of their communities to the merits of the Scout work among their boys.

All were in accord with the plans to organize the campaign so thoroughly that everyone able to contribute might be seen by a campaign worker. Over two-thirds of the captains were reported as already secured, with many captains having full teams of five men already recruited.

It was the unanimous opinion that they would bend every effort to have all the teams present 100 per cent at the "Kick-off" dinner.


