Capt. Hedley Speaker at Men's Fellowship Club Meeting March 3

The Mens Fellowship club will hold its regular monthly meeting and dinner Thursday, March 3rd, at half past six in the parish house of the Presbyterian church. Following the get-together at six-thirty dinner will be served at seven. The club will have as its guest Captain John H. Hedley, who was one of the aces in the British flying forces. All men are invited to attend this dinner and meet and hear Captain Hedley.

He is one of the few men who served and lives to tell about it. Floyd Gibbons says "He is one of the luckiest men alive." Once when 20,000 feet up in his plane he was thrown from it and landed on the tail of the plane three hundred feet lower. Again he was shot down in flames by the Red Knight, Riechtofen, and lived for nine months in a German prison camp. The average life of a British airman was said to be three weeks but he survived fourteen months of real service. His health was much shattered by his experiences but he has now recovered so that he gives a most interesting and entertaining talk on aviation and his experiences in it. Captain Hedley is not only an aviator but he is also a licensed lawyer, being registered in England, Canada and the United States, and a certified public accountant. He is much in demand as a lecturer and we are most fortunate in being able to secure his services.

DEEP SEA EXPLORER WILL LECTURE HERE

Gloria Hollister to Describe Experiences with Beebe in Bermuda

An absorbingly interesting story of the remarkable undersea work being done by the Bermuda Oceanographic expedition of the New York Zoological society will be related by Gloria Hollister, technical associate of Dr. William Beebe, head of the expedition, in the auditorium of the Deerfield-Shields high school on Tuesday afternoon, March 1. The title of Miss Hollister's lecture is "With Beebe in Bermuda."

This notable feature is being sponsored by the Highland Park Woman's club, and the members of the Diving club of the high school will be special guests of the club on this occasion.

Miss Hollister tells a graphic story of her experiences with this expedition, and the talk is illustrated by slides and motion pictures. She has devised a means of making fish transparent for anatomical examination, which scientists says has revolutionized the study of marine life, and this process she also will explain in her lecture here.
