Lasley Turbine Co. Elects Officers and Plans to Build Shop

Plans for the erection of a new engineering shop and establishment of its own airport in Waukegan next summer were drafted at the annual meeting of stockholders of the Lasley Turbine Co., 34 Terminal building, Waukegan, last week.

Three hundred stockholders of the firm attended the conference at which officials of the organization announced their intentions of purchasing 160 acres of land near Waukegan for the proposed airport to be used in connection with the turbine shops for the testing and installation of airplane motors.

According to the announcement, it is hoped that the new shops and airport can be erected early this summer prior to the erection of a large manufacturing plant by officials of the company.
