due to the greens at Sunset Valley. The late Edward M. Laing, who built up the course and was in charge up to the time of his recent lamented death, made the perfecting of each and every one of the eighteen greens a labor of love.

The results of his skill, foresight and constant care were especially evident last summer. Drought conditions and various diseases that prey on grass, made unsightly brown patches and crippled playing conditions on numerous greens of other courses in the local area. But at Sunset Valley, thanks to enough water and not too much, to proper "feeding" and fertilizing and to constant watchfulness, the players enjoyed perfect putting greens from beginning to end of the season.

Mr. Kelly is making every effort to achieve the same results in the coming season, and this is a feature which the membership committee is finding very potent in influencing early signing up of members for 1932. "Your combination of convenience, low cost and splendid playing conditions throughout is unique and cannot be beaten," is the way one man recently spoke in announcing his intention of joining the Sunset Valley Golf club.

Major Improvements

Some local golfers are still unaware of major improvements completed toward the close of last season on this local championship course which the Highland Park East Park board has developed primarily for golfers in the Park district area.

The tenth hole was made into a tricky "dog-leg," with a water hazard on the second shot to the green. The eleventh is a par three over the Skokie Creek. The long twelfth also now has a water-hazard on the drive. Earlier in the year the seventeenth green was enlarged and trapped so as to make this semi-windup hole one of the most interesting of all the eighteen.

There has been an unusual amount of interest among prospective members for so early in the year. They find Sunset Valley the answer to the question, "Where and how can I play golf without having to think of that well-known depression?" "The only depression at Sunset Valley is the pond in the third fairway and a well-placed second shot will get any golfer over that one," is the way one member puts it.
