CHINDBLOM FAVORS WET REFERENDUM

Joins Forces in House in Favor of Vote on Eighteenth Amendment

Congressman Carl R. Chindblom, who has been regarded as a dry legislator from the Tenth district. on Saturday officially announced himself in favor of resubmission of the 18th amendment to the states and in favor of modification of the prohibition law to permit the manufacture of 4 per cent beer. In a signed statement sent by him to the Highland, Park Press and the Lake Forester Congressman Chindblom says:

Washington, D.C., Feb. 27, 1932 "I have today signed the motion discharge the Committee on the Judiciary from the consideration of H. J. Res. 208, which proposes an amendment to the 18th Amendment of the Constitution under the terms of which Congress shall retain the power to regulate or prohibit the liquor business except in states which may authorize and regulate manufacture, sale, transportation or use of intoxicating liquors within their own borders, provided, however, that Congress may not authorize the shipment of intoxicating liquors for any purpose into a state whose own laws prohibit the manufacture, sale, transportation or use of such liquors.
