Anne Frierson, brilliant young Southern playwright will be guest artist on the March program of the Ravinia Woman's club Wednesday, March 9, at the Village house at 2:30 p.m. and a rare treat is in store for all who hear this young interpreter of folk poetry and music of the Gullah Negroes of South Carolina.

Miss Frierson is the slim, fair haired girl from South Carolina, who startled Evanston audiences and Chicago critics not long ago, when her play of South Carolina negro life, "Quagmire," was produced by the University theater. Some critics, among them Meyer Levin of the Chicago Daily News, said "Quagmire" was better than "Porgy."

This brilliant young playwright is already being spoken of as another Cornelia Skinner or another Ruth Draper. Her work is original.

Aided by her banjo, Miss Frierson gives a drama of Gullah negro life in story and song. It is a simple story, because it is of a simple folk. It is beautiful and ugly, stark, yet spiritual. It is life. She pictures the romance of their lives, the music of their souls, their religious fervor. To hear her tell her stories, sing her songs, to see her give the foundation material of a "spiritual" and see the steps by which it grows into a dance, all this is a delightful experience which no auditor will ever forget.

You who read this column can have little idea of the sense of gratification enjoyed by the writer when the word "Family" can follow the picture reviewed. And this week there are several instances for which we rejoice and one of which is given the highest rating the National committee can give. "Way Back Home" is the one referred to, the first presentation of Seth Parker in the films, and refreshing entertainment, free from sophistication. It is a rural comedy with delightful comments by Phillip Lord. Family. "Heaven on Earth" has an interesting and unusual setting for a highly melodramatic theme, in which the adopted son of a Mississippi riverboat captain, becomes involved in a feud, long standing and bitter, between the crew and the river folk. Family. "Over the Hill." This is a strong presentation of an all too frequent situation in life, a psychological study of the development of children embarking on careers and of a mother loath to lose them. It is a gently moving, human drama. The surprising versatility of Mae Marsh in the role of the young mother and then of the forsaken mother, makes fascinating entertainment, even thought at times heart gripping. Family. "Rich Man's Folly" suggested by Dicken's "Dombey and Son" Unusual to a screen overloaded with sex so frequently, this frankly sentimental and moralizing picture will be received by almost every type of audience with genuine enjoyment.
