### Seven Candidates on Republican Primary Ticket For Congress

Congressman Carl R. Chindblom will be opposed for the Republican nomination by six candidates, according to the records on file at Springfield.

The candidates who will oppose Chindblom are Ralph E. Church of Evanston, James Simpson, Jr., of Adsworth, Charles West of Chicago, Eric A. Sodersten, Chicago, R. O. Johnson of Chicago and Stephen A. Day of Evanston.

#### Church Race

Entrance of Ralph E. Church into the race following his previously stated plan to withdraw and run for re-election as a member of the state legislature from the sixth district, came as a surprise. According to press dispatches from Evanston Mr. Church declared that he had changed his mind because of pressure by friends.

With all of his opponents certain to draw a large number of votes from the district in which their political activities have centered, Mr. Chindblom will find it necessary to make a determined campaign. Congressman Chindblom was unable to take personal charge of his campaign two years ago as press of business forced him to remain in Washington.

#### Democrats in Fight

The nominee on the Republican ticket will also face a determined candidate on the Democratic ticket. Several are fighting hard for the nomination, including Thomas J. Lynch of Glencoe, Einar Sorenson of Channel Lake, and Charles F. O'Grady of Chicago.

The primaries will be held on April 12 at the same time that the voters decide on state and county nominations.

There will be specimens of the Chinese juniper which must soon replace all read cedars, on account of the cedar apple rust, which is gradually spreading through the country.

A peek into Mrs. Klaber's garage would show many interesting varieties of rock plants now being forced, while the cellar is blossoming out with everything needed to make a garden from cold frame and manure to stones and dirt.

This course will appeal to both the new gardener, and the old timer, as it starts with the ABC's, but goes on into discussion of newer and finer varieties, as well as the possible solution of many of the difficult problems encountered on our north shore.
