

# DEERFIELD PONIES DEFEAT OAK PARK IN THRILLING GAME

## Victory Puts Deerfield in Second Place Tie with Evanston

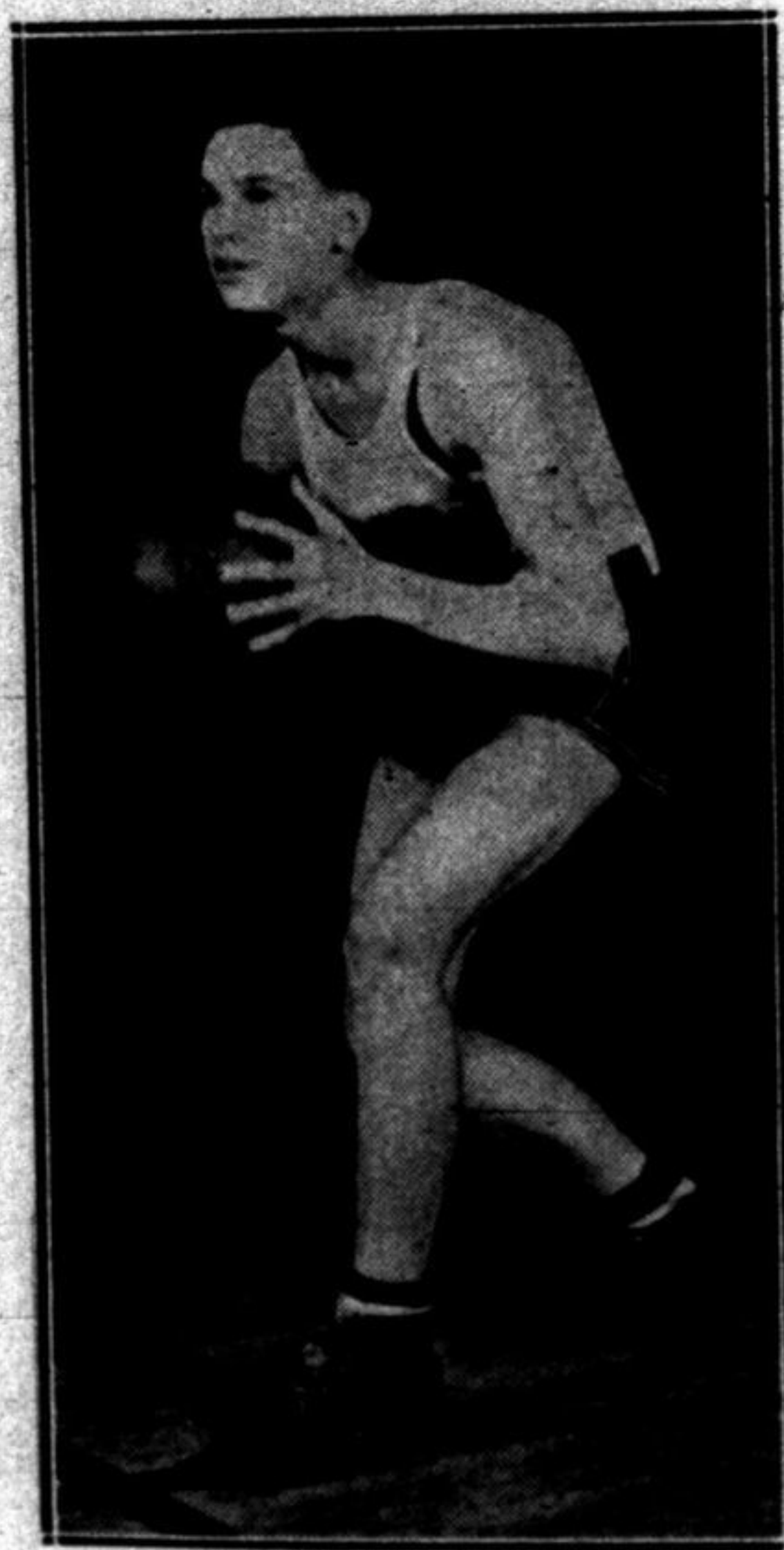
Showing an early burst of speed and scoring in the first quarter, the Deerfield lights defeated Oak Park in a thrilling game last Friday night, at the Deerfield gym, by the score of 21-18.

The first quarter found Deerfield displaying a speedy attack, sinking three field goals before Oak Park could get started. Emery, of Deerfield, sank two field goals to lead the scoring in this quarter, while Jones and Cummings, both of Deerfield, each sank a field goal. Arado, of Oak Park, got an under-the-basket shot just as the quarter ended, to make the score 8-2 in Deerfield's favor.

Still using their speedy attack, but letting up a little on their fine defense, Jones and Cummings made two baskets in the second quarter, raising the score to 12-2 in Deerfield's favor. Then Oak Park began to click and they scored five points on a basket, two free throws by Brown, and two more by Rieflar. The score stood at 12-8 at the half in favor of Deerfield.

When the third quarter opened, the Oak Park boys began to play basketball, and shortly after the whistle, Arado, of Oak Park, scored on a long shot from the side. Then Emery, of Deerfield, sank a free throw, followed by a basket by Cummings, to make the score 15-10 for Deerfield. Speeding up, the Oak Park ponies scored 4 points in the remainder of the quarter, while

Deerfield could only get two points. The score at the end of the third quarter was 17-14, with Deerfield still holding the lead.

In the last quarter Bernardini, of Deerfield, brought the crowd to their feet with two long shots, both from the side. Oak Park scored four points on free-throws, but couldn't get a basket. The final score was Deerfield 21, Oak Park 18.

Emery, held to only five points by Oak Park, played his usual game both on offense and defense, while Cummings was the high point man with 8 points. Brown, of Oak Park, collected 7 points to lead his team in scoring.

Before the game last Friday night there were three teams tied for second place, Oak Park, Evanston, and Deerfield. Both Evanston and Deerfield won last night to remain in a tie for second place. They play each other next Friday night at the Deerfield gym.

## VOLLEYBALL TOURNEY TO BE STARTED SOON

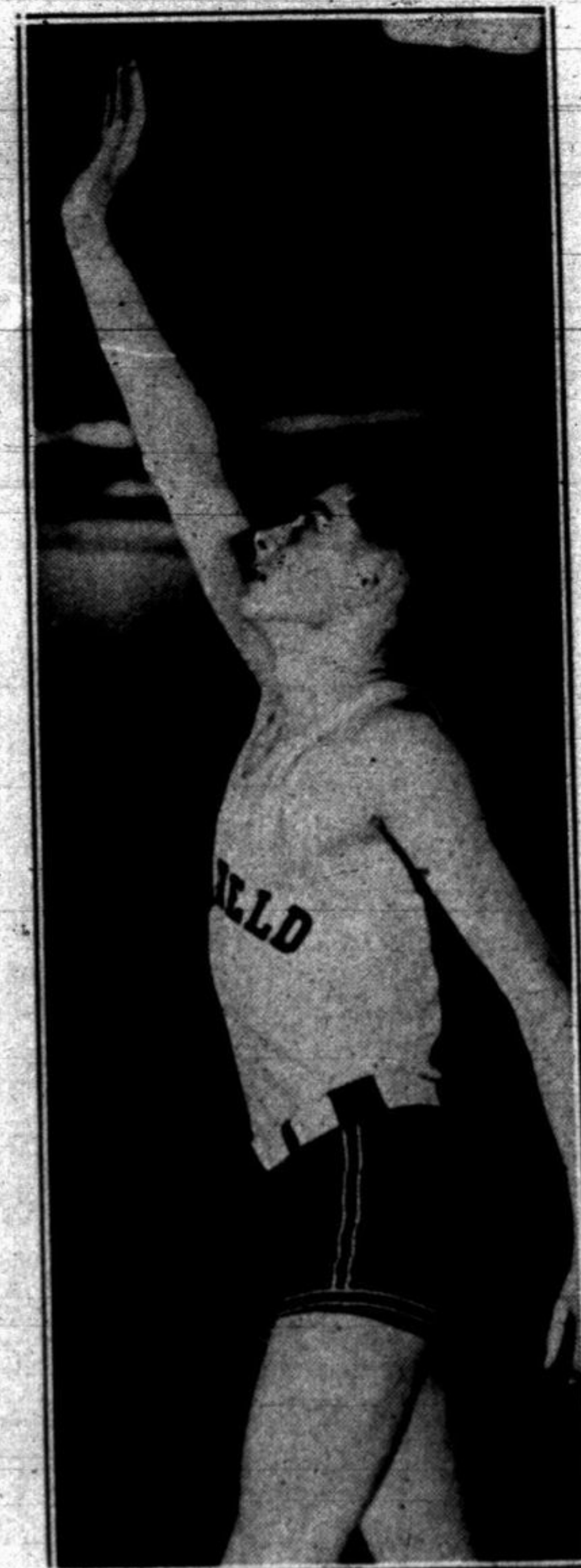
