posals known as the Beck-Linthicum amendment to the Federal Constitution. It provides for the resubmission of national prohibition to the states by action of conventions chosen in the several states for the specific purpose of acting on the question of ratification.

"I shall vote for the consideration of this joint resolution in the House and shall also vote for the passage of the joint resolution itself and thereby for the resubmission of the 18th Amendment to the people of the several states.

The next test upon the prohibition question in the House of Representatives will doubtless be upon the proposal to legalize, under the existing 18th Amendment and the existing enforcement laws, the manufacture and sale of 4 per cent beer in states which do not themselves prohibit the same. I believe the legalization of such a beverage, as being non-intoxicating in fact, to be permissible under a fair construction of the 18th Amendment. I will therefore support such legislation.

"I had no part in the submission or ratification of the 18th Amendment. It became a part of the Federal Constitution before I became a Member of Congress. I have supported laws and appropriations for the enforcement of that Amendment and believe it is the duty of Congress to provide necessary means for such enforcement. Neither of

the proposals, which I will support as above stated, is inconsistent with my course heretofore. If re-elected to Congress, I will continue to support resubmission and modification, along the lines hereby indicated.
