Routine Business at Regular Meeting of Council Monday Eve

The regular session of the city council Monday evening was occupied chiefly by routine business. A petition signed by five master plumbers asking the city to adopt an ordinance to license plumbers was referred to the corporation counsel.

A petition signed by 33 property owners in the vicinity of Green Bay road and Park avenue objecting to the establishing of a baseball park on the Richards property was placed on file, as it was reported that the project was to be abandoned.

Petitions were received from the Ravinia Civic association, the Lincoln Civic association and the Public Works Improvement association urging the re-routing of Sheridan road through the city and this was referred to the mayor and commissioner of streets.

The report of Police Magistrate Schwery showed fines amounting to \$338. The building report showed building improvements started during February totaling \$4,575 in estimated cost, one of the lowest monthly totals on record here. However, Building Inspector Morris reports that already this month there is indication of revived interest in building, and two applications were received Tuesday, besides many inquiries.

DRIVE TO RELEASE IDLE DOLLARS HERE

Campaign to Sell Reconstruction Bonds Here in Charge of Commerce Chamber

It is estimated that one and a half billion dollars are in hiding in this country. The Citizens Reconstruction Organization, headed by Colonel Frank Knox of Chicago, and organized at the request of President Hoover is launching a Nationwide Campaign with a two fold objective, to bring this enormous amount of hidden and idle money back into circulation, and to attempt an education as to the function of money, of banks, of credit and to show the disastrous consequences when credit is restricted by money withdrawn from the arteries of business.

Effort Will Be Made

An effort will be made to induce hoarders of funds to re-deposit the money in sound banks, or to invest it in good securities, or attractive real estate holdings. But for those who cannot be interested along those lines, as a special inducement, the government is bringing out a "baby" bond issue, maturing in one year, redeemable in sixty days, bearing two per cent interest, in denominations of \$50, \$100 and \$500. These bonds may be considered the safest security in the world.
