Communications were read from Congressman Chindblom and Senators Glenn and Lewis, expressing their opposition to the LaFollette-Costigan Bill dealing with a Federal appropriation in the amount of \$275,000,000 within the next two years. This bill has been defeated by Congress and upon motion of Robert Denzel, seconded and carried, the matters ordered placed on file.
