## INFANT WELFARE OBJECT OF DRIVE

Annual Campaign for Funds by Local Branch; Need Great This Year

Mrs. Bernard E. Newman, 384 Ravine drive, Highland Park, president of Highland Park-Ravinia center of the Infant Welfare society of Chicago, is asking citizens of this community who contribute regularly to this necessary work for the benefit of needy babies in Chicago to dig down deep and help this year as they have done before, in spite of multitudinous calls for help for other worthy causes.

Many people seem to be under the impression that the recent successful effort of the Joint Emergency Relief Fund of Cook county to raise ten million dollars for relief will take care of all social service work in Cook county. That this is not the case is stressed in a recent statement by Edward L. Ryerson, Jr., president of the Joint Emergency Relief Fund:

"The regular health, child welfare and other welfare work carried on by more than 200 social agencies in Chicago and Cook county is absolutely essential work and must not be curtailed," said Mr. Ryerson. "Therefore, regular supporters of these welfare agencies should give their usual subscriptions in support of this work."

"The money raised by the Joint Emergency Relief Fund is used chiefly for relief. Some of the fund
