Warmest February Day on Record in County Was 66 Degrees, 25th

When the mercury climbed to 66 degrees on February 25, it established the warmest February day on record here, according to John O. Russell Hendrickson, 21 years old, Laux, official U.S. weather observer Twentieth street and Dickey avenue, for the Waukegan district. Waukegan, died last week at the warmest day in February last year was 54 degrees on the 3rd.
