## Sally Likes Plane; Jimmy Favors Auto

James Dunn and Sally Eilers, who scored such a sensational triumph together in "Bad Girl" and who are again co-starred in the Fox production, "Dance Team," cannot agree on the matter of thrills and speed.

Sally, an aviation enthusiast and a licensed air pilot, frowns down upon Jimmy as being old fashioned because he claims automobile racing is the "thrill of thrills." And to prove that he is wrong she has made repeated offers to him to take him up for a flight, but for some reason Jimmy always manages to have another date when Sally comes zooming down in one of her three fast ships in which she does her cloud chasing.

During the making of "Dance Team" Miss Eilers confided to Minna Gombell, who is also in the cast, and director Sidney Lanfield that she hoped their next picture would have an aviation sequence. Then she would get Dunn up among the clouds and give him the thrill of his life.

"Dance Team" was adapted from the popular novel of Sarah Addington by Edwin Burke, who wrote the sparkling dialogue for the previous Dunn-Eilers picture, "Bad Girl."

## Introduces New Kind Photography Technique

A novel method of camera treatment was introduced at Universal City by Karl Freund, dean of German cinematographers, during the filming of the stage comedy success, "Strictly Dishonorable."

The innovation is in reality a moving closeup, which in many instances covers action in all parts of a setting and makes unnecessary the customary "long shot." The latter, of course, has the disadvantage that the figures of the character are necessarily smaller on the screen, and their facial expressions cannot register as effectively as in a close-up.

The advantages of Freund's method are illustrated in the picture in many long scenes between Paul Lukas and Sidney Fox, or between Miss Fox and Lewis Stone, in which they walk all about a large room and carry on spirited arguments. Everywhere they go the camera follows them, and the result is a series of long, unbroken close-ups of entire episodes—closeups, but filled with action and a constantly changing background.

Lukas, Miss Fox and Stone play the featured roles in this romantic love comedy, which was directed by John M. Stahl.
