therefore idle dollar at once destroys at least five dollars of credit and thereby becomes an outstanding figure in the army of unemployed. Each idle dollar adds to the number of idle men. Unconsciously perhaps, the dollar hider has struck at the foundation of all business, the Nation's credit.

Great interest is being shown in the Garden school to be held every afternoon next week, at 510 S. Linden avenue, Highland Park; Mrs. Frederick Fisher and Mrs. Eugene H. Klaber in charge.

The large basement is being transformed into a small estate, and the smell of earth and growing plants defies the winter, and gives all who enter the assurance that spring is more than around the corner—it is here.

In one corner a couple of garden chairs are grouped around a gay little tea table, while the service yard is separated by a picket fence from the growing garden, which has real grass, shrubs and flowers.

This is to be a practical course in gardening, starting with design and execution on Monday, the practical details of growing and propagating plants on Tuesday, beautiful garden slides on Wednesday, the rock garden from start to finish, with slides, on Thursday, the care of plants and discussion of newer plants on Friday, and on Saturday detailed discussion of the shady garden. In addition extra features are planned for round table discussion each day, with pictures and lists of many lovely plants for varying purposes.
