#### Story in New Orleans Paper Is Interesting Account of Her Triumph

A story concerning one of our well known and much beloved townspeople, Mrs. Daniel Cobb, was discovered in the Times-Picayune of New Orleans of Sunday, Jan. 31. Mardi Gras is but a name to those who have never had the good fortune to witness the splendor and charm of that carnival, but back of it all lies the story of how the gallant gentlemen of fifty years ago, versed in mythology built up from the story of Proteus an organization which all down through the years has come forth in some new guise to charm and delight the city of New Orleans, and the name of Proteus goes hand in hand with splendor and magnificence.
