An interesting address on the Nursery school was made by Miss Flora Levy recently at the Green Bay school P. T. A. meeting and this talk is here summarized for the perusal of those interested:

In a descriptive talk about the Nursery school, explaining the advantages and disadvantages, Miss Levy tried to bring out especially the fact, that the aim of the Nursery school is to serve as a supplement, rather than a substitute, for the home. The chief concern of the school is to secure for the preschool child the best possible condition for meeting the needs of growth, Miss Levy said and continued:

The period of early childhood is an exceedingly important one, and it requires a skilled job to provide a really ideal background for the physical, mental and social development of young children. To keep alone a preschool child legitimately and profitably busy is no easy task.
