

Local Man Candidate For County Auditor

Archibald Abercromby announces that he is a candidate for the office of county auditor for Lake county on the Republican party ticket at the Primaries Tuesday, April 12, 1932.

He has been a resident of Highland Park for thirty years, and a property owner since 1919, at which

time he acquired a home at 452 Lincoln avenue where he now resides with his wife and two children. The candidate's educational training was received in the local public grade school at Elm Place, the Evanston Township and Deerfield Township high schools, supplemented by two years of special training at the Northwestern University School of Commerce during evening sessions.

Mr. Abercromby served A. O. Fay lodge, No. 676, A. F. & A. M. of Highland Park in various capacities for a number of years, culminating in his selection as Master during 1921.

Shortly after his affiliation with the Highland Park Elks Lodge, No. 1362, he was placed in line for office and later chosen by his associates as Exalted Ruler in 1929. He resigned from the employ of the C. N. S. & M. railroad in 1918 to enter

the field of public accounting, for an established firm of Public Accountants and Auditors in Chicago, New York and Kansas City.

Since 1925 Mr. Abercromby has been engaged in the practice of public accounting along the North Shore and in other suburban areas contiguous to Chicago.

Mr. Abercromby desires the earnest support of the residents of Highland Park, Deerfield, Lake Forest, Ravinia, Bannockburn and Highwood in addition to the support being sought in all other sections of Lake county.

Resident of R.R. Men's Home Killed by Train in Ravinia on Tuesday

William T. Younts, 67, since July of 1928 a resident of the railroad men's home on Beach street in Highland Park, was killed instantly at 8:30 o'clock Tuesday morning when he walked in the path of a Chicago & North Western northbound train at the Roger Williams avenue intersection in Highland Park. According to unofficial reports

there was only one actual witness who reported that Younts apparently did not see the train and stepped directly to the center of the tracks as the train approached from the south.

Death was caused instantly after the impact as a result of head injuries. At the H. F. Kelley funeral home where the body was taken, it was also reported that Younts had sustained a broken leg. An inquest into the man's death was ordered by Dr. John L. Taylor, Lake county coroner, for 10 o'clock Wednesday morning.
