Nathan Klee, Well Known Resident Dies; Funeral Held Friday, March 12th

Nathan Klee, 61 years old, 525 Linden avenue, Highland Park, an insurance broker in Chicago for more than 40 years, died March 10, after an illness of four weeks. At the time of his death he was senior partner in Klee, Rogers, Loeb & Wolff, insurance brokers at 175 West Jackson boulevard. Mr. Klee was active in charity work and from 1909 to 1919 he was treasurer and a director of the Jewish Charities of Chicago.

Mr. Klee was born in Germany and received his education there and in Chicago. He married Florence Thalheimer of Richmond, Va., in 1910. Besides his widow he is sur-

vived by three sons, Edward, Howard, and Kenneth, a brother, Simon Klee, of Klee Brothers & Co., clothiers and four sisters, Mrs. Joseph K. Salomon, and the Misses Rose, Julia, and Betty Klee. He was a member of the Chicago Historical society, the Art institute, the Field museum, and of the Standard and Northmoor Country clubs. Funeral services were held at 4 o'clock last Friday afternoon at the residence. Burial was in Rosehill cemetery.

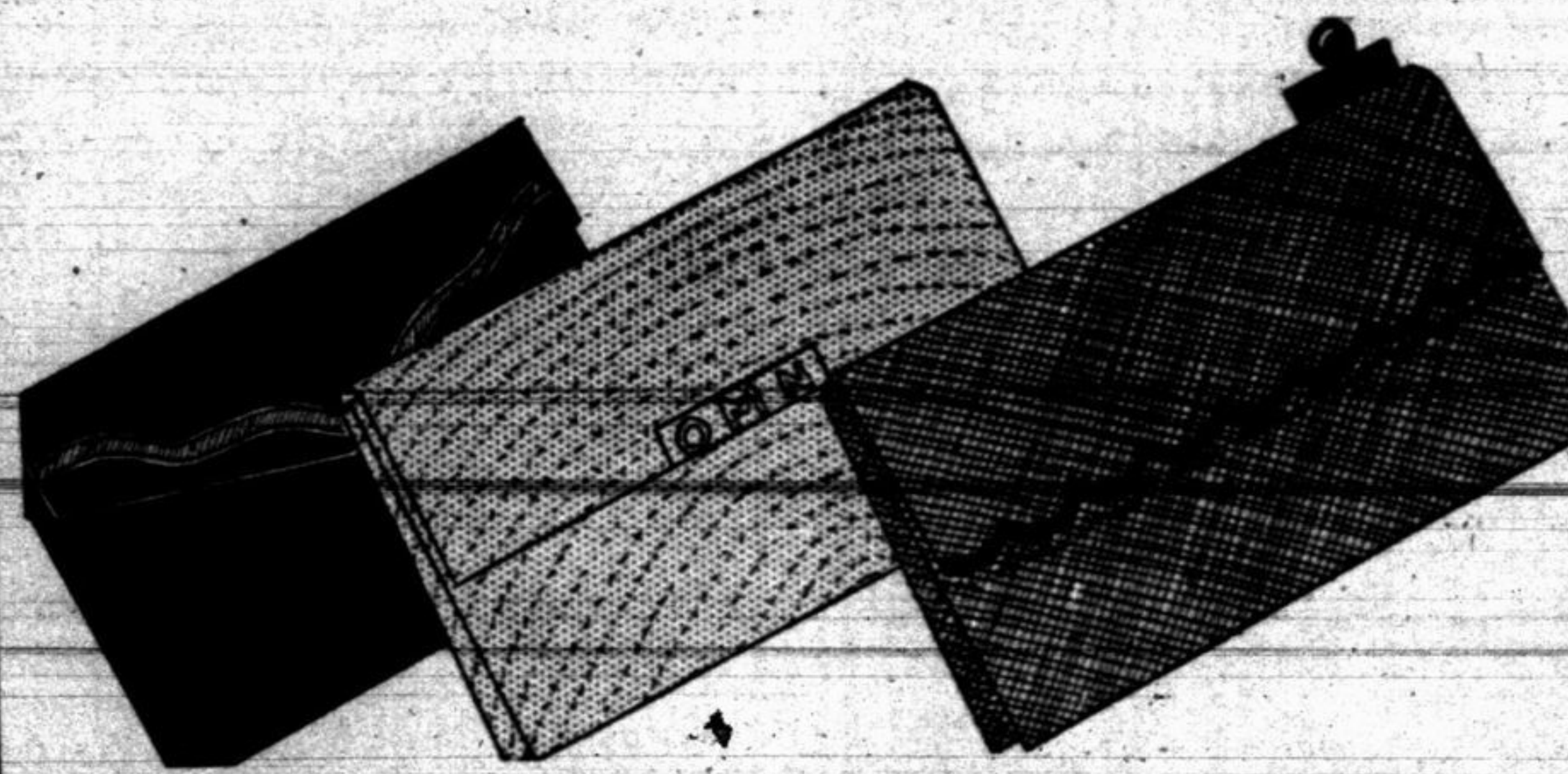
