

DEERFIELD BOXERS BEAT MORTON TEAM IN RETURN MATCH

Winning eight bouts, losing four, and tying one, Deerfield's boxing team defeated the Morton squad last Saturday night in the boys' gym.

The bouts which began at 8:15 and continued until after eleven, were featured by three knockouts, all of which were in the home team's favor.

The first fight was an exhibition between Nolan and Knaak, both of Deerfield. Nolan had the edge on Knaak in weight and won the decision.

In the first bout on the scheduled card, "Mac" Lowe (D) hammered out a decision over Sucharda (M) after nearly knocking out the Morton lad in the last round. Lowe weighed 154 and Sucharda 148.

Spatsy Tomei, Deerfield's 98 pound whirlwind, put away Hosengard in the third round after scoring three knockdowns, one of which occurred in the opening minute of the first round.

"Eddie" Brennan (D), 109, held off his heavier opponent for three rounds for the only draw of the evening. Lozeau, the Morton boy, weighed 114 pounds.

"Augie" Baracani (D), 115, coolly gave Mass (M), 116, a lesson in boxing and was awarded the second knockout for Deerfield, a technical.

Ed Jindau (D), 165, and Sianta (M), 168, came out of their corners evidently intent on annihilating themselves. Knocking each other down with terrific "haymakers," the two put up what was generally declared the most sensational bout of the match. At the end of the second stanza it was evident that both boys had hard work keeping on their feet. "Ed" floored his opponent twice for a count of nine in the last round, and finally slammed him to the canvas for the regulation length, scoring the third knockout.

"Joe" Taziali (D), 115, put up a

desperate battle but lost the decision to Napolitan (M), 114.

"Pug" Jacks (D), 124, pounded out a decision over Vaughan (M), 124, in the ninth bout, after a nice boxing exhibition.

Traini (D), 130, and Sesnik (M), 130, put up a strenuous fight in which much hard hitting was evident. Traini took the decision.

"Jimmy" Getty (D), 134, fought a running battle with Greenburg (M), 132, and won the decision.

Skopek (M), 138, outboxed "Ed" Cazel (D), 140, and eked out a decision. "Ed" took an exceptional amount of punishment.

Gambino (M), 140, got under Sture Johnson's guard and battered out a decision. Johnson weighed 140.

The last bout on the card brought together Reno Giangiorgi (D), 150, and Dodlesak (M), 146. The two smashed each other around for three rounds and Reno was awarded the decision.

The judges were Eney from Great Lakes, and Thielen from Fort Sheridan. Green from Cicero refereed the bouts.

DEERFIELD LIGHTS WIN SECOND PLACE THIRD TIME STRAIGHT

For the third consecutive time, the Deerfield-Shields lightweight basketball team finished the Suburban league in second place with a record of seven victories and three defeats.

It is also the second time that the Morton ponies have led the league with a string of nine wins and one loss.

The Evanston and Oak Park lights tied for third place, with an average of .660, having won six and lost four.

In the heavyweight division, the New Trier and Oak Park quintets tied for first place, having won eight and lost two. Evanston and Morton tied for third, with six won and four lost. Deerfield and Proviso are for fifth.

"Bill" Emery, the high point man in the league last year, repeated his

feat this season by snaring 100 points in ten games.

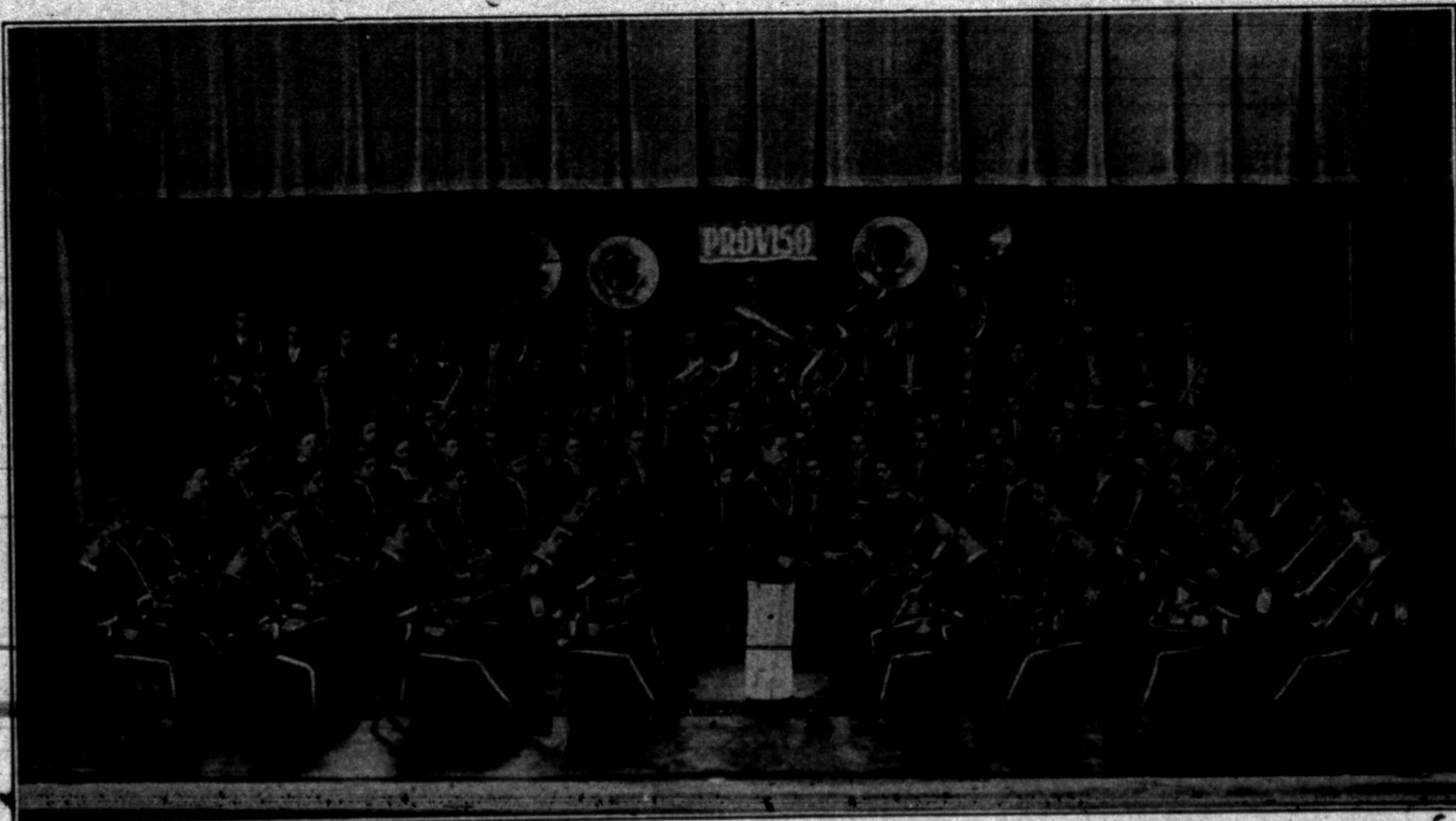
