preted. A lady of exceptional charm and keen intellect, Miss Taylor, now Mrs. Daniel Cobb of Highland Park, was selected by Proteus to dance the first quadrille with him, and from this circumstance Miss Taylor was known as the first queen. She

was attired in a ball gown of pale lavender satin and brocade, with the train reaching from the shoulders, and a Medici collar. Her bouquet was of English violets and her jewels were the pearls worn by her great-grandmother in London in 1804. She wore no mantel or jewels of the organization as the queens do today, although the king presented her with a very handsome pendant engraved with the initials of the organization."

Wage Campaign to Conserve Hubbard Hill and Ravine

The campaign of the Hubbard Woods Improvement association waged in the interest of saving Hubbard hill and ravine as a natural beauty spot and of having as much as possible of the north shore through automobile traffic diverted from Sheridan road to routes west of the villages is apparently evoking wide interest and sympathy in these communities. President Walter L. Edwards of Hubbard Woods has received copies of resolutions adopted by many different influential bodies on the north shore emphatically endorsing the views of the Hubbard Woods association and offering co-operation in the campaign. Among the organizations that have taken formal action of this nature are the following: Highland Park Board of Education, the Porcupines of Highland Park, Lincoln Civic association of Highland Park, Ravinia Civic association, South Glencoe Improvement association, Glencoe Village council, Winnetka Village council, Winnetka chamber of commerce, Winnetka board of education, (Winnetka) Village Improvement association, Indian Hill Improvement association, Garden club of Winnetka, Rotary club of Winnetka, Kenilworth Village council, and Wilmette Village council. Under the leadership of Mr. Edgar Crilly approximately 95 property owners on Sheridan road in Winnetka have signed a petition with the same objectives. The recent meeting of the Winnetka Village caucus for 1932 adopted the objects of this campaign as a plank in the platform. The resolutions and petitions will be presented to appropriate officials, according to plans, at an early date.

furnish an adequate background for the development of the young child. Unlike the Nursery school, where a wide range of learning is going on, the home is not always able to provide an ideal surrounding for the child, who at that age, is constantly exploring and testing and experimenting with things. Children at that age learn many things with great rapidity and with great interest. They are learning motor coordination; they are learning the work about them. They are acquiring vocabulary, language, means of expression, music, how to make pictures, etc. Children are provided with scissors and tools, even at the age of two, and neither fear, nor apprehension is expressed, consequently, no accidents are happening.

We do not often put stress enough on the value of friends, as distinct from the value of family relationship. Children need their friends of their own age, as much as the age of two and three as in later years. They need their own social group and their common interest of the same ages; and they need too, their family relationships with father and mother and brothers and sisters. They are not all mutually exclusive relationships, they should re-inforce and supplement one another.

After indicating the effects of the Nursery school on the child as a whole, Miss Levy talked about the importance of the child-parent relationships. She did not agree that an ideal parent-child relationship is best maintained by having the mother and child together all twenty-four hours. So many cases of difficulty grew out of unrelieved companionship of mother and child which are avoidable when a reasonable amount of separation is provided, such as a Nursery school offers. If you have the complete and unrestricted care of a little child, you are almost sure to fall into one or other of the common emotional pitfalls of parent-hood, and there are some very real pitfalls. If you are conscientious, and rather executive in type, you are apt to do entirely too much bossing and dominating, and apt to either destroy his initiative, or set him off in hopeless opposition to yourself. We find that the separation of mother and child very often improves the emotional relationship. Mother and child, when each have their own outside interests, come back together in a better position to appreciate each other; mothers become more of a treat, so does the child. The Nursery school may aid in helping to provide a perfect and ideal child mother relationship. The Nursery school can never remove the need for better educated parents. It may become one agency for educating parents, and a very efficient one.

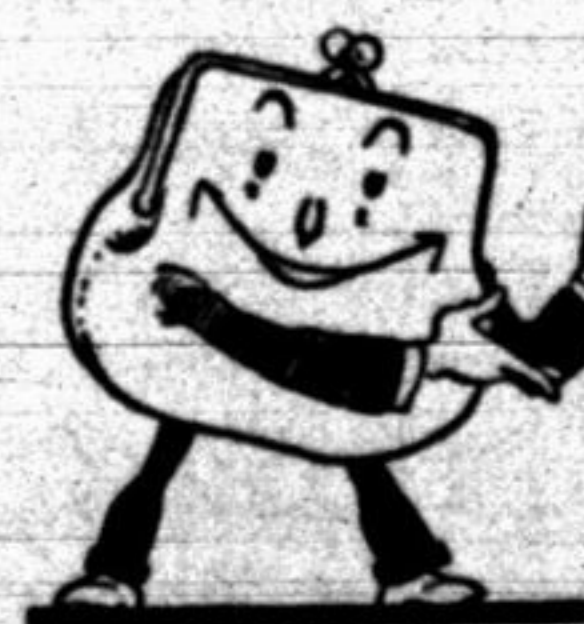
Garden Questions

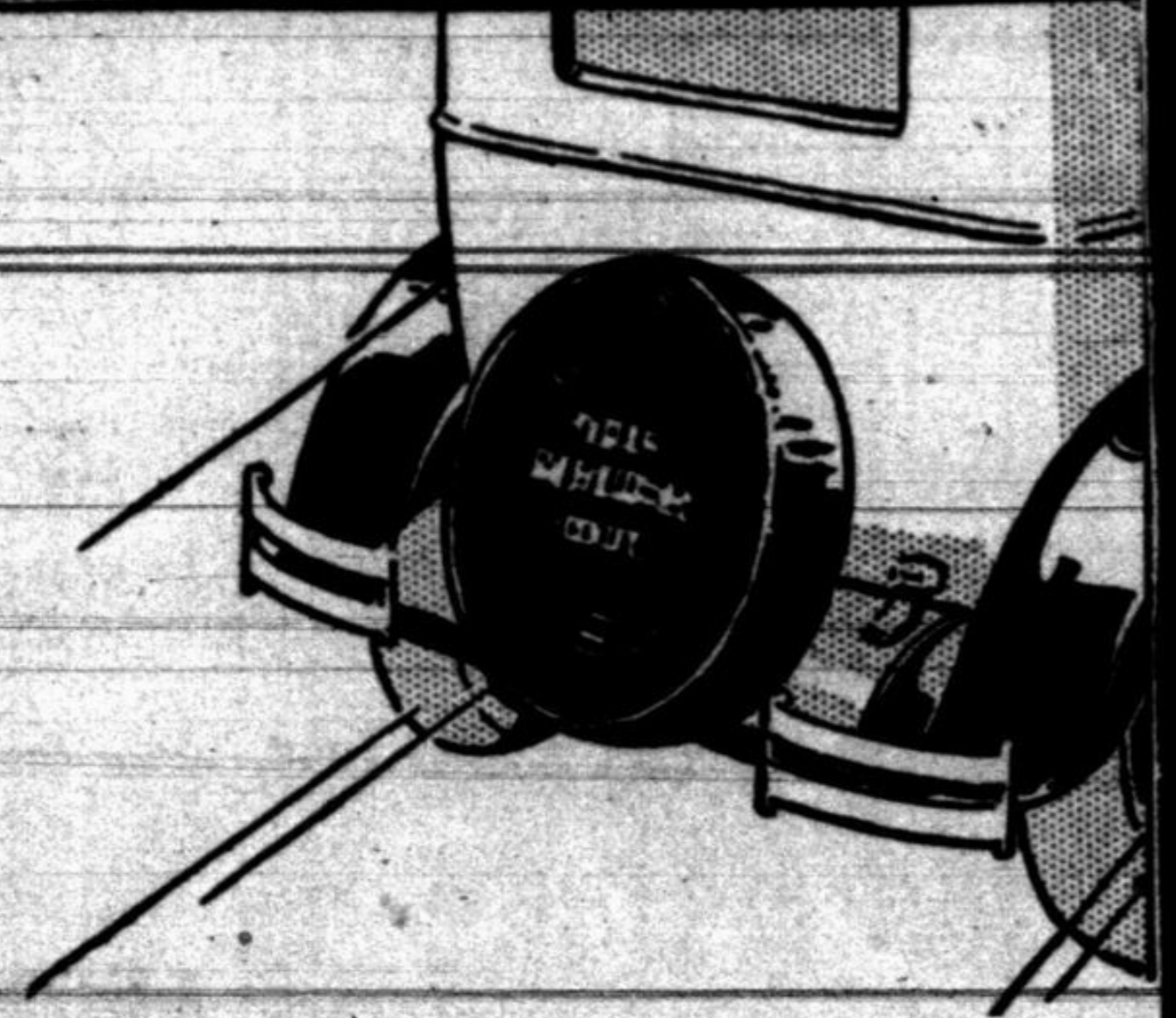

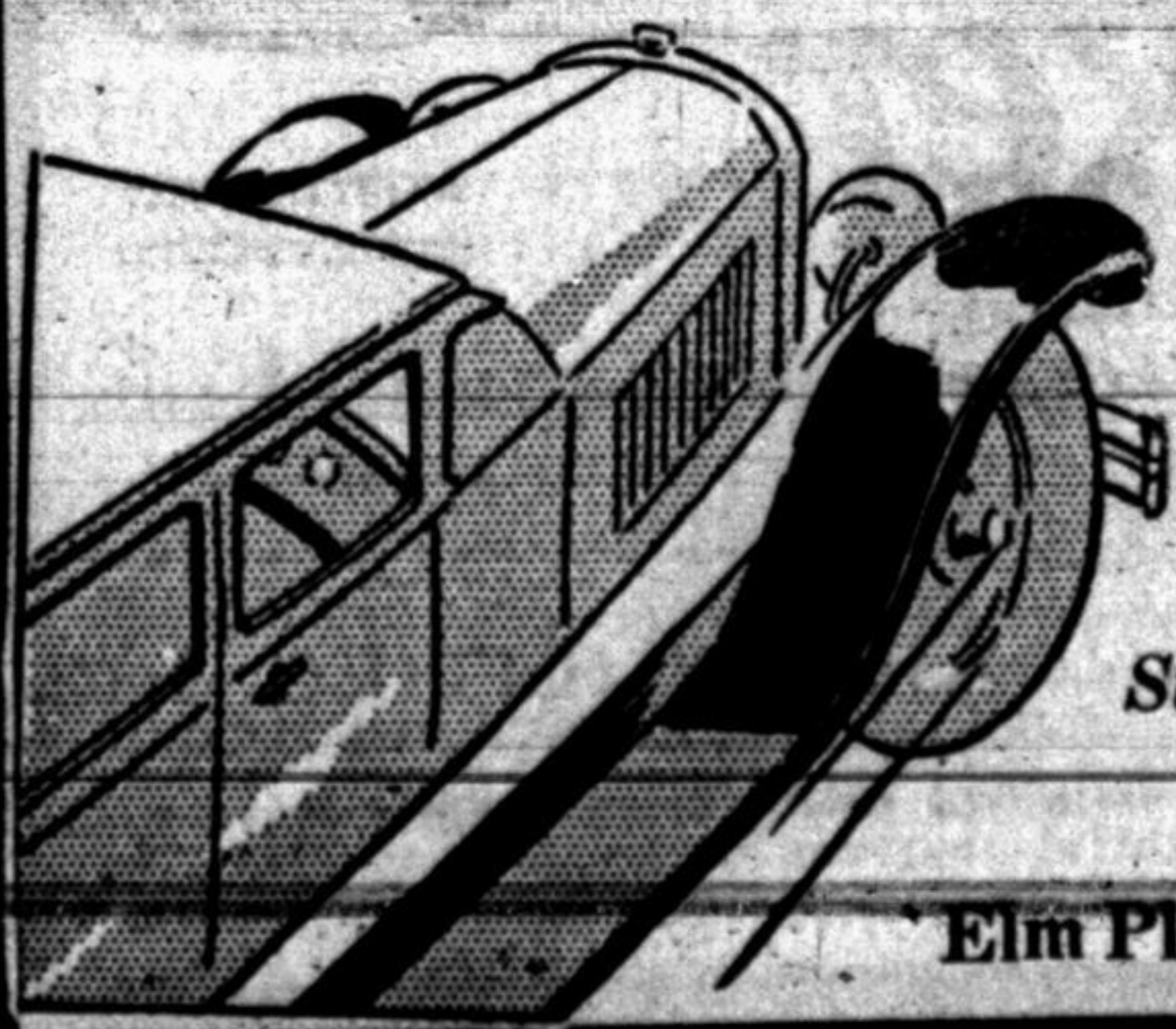
