We shall begin with the top-notch picture of the week, "Emma," one which many of us have been waiting for, and may I again remind you to be patient in respect to the pictures you hear about and are anxious to see, and show your appreciation of the fact that they are secured for us by our local manager, by viewing them here, and taking the whole family when ever an exceptional treat is thus provided. This is an unusual drama, centering about a house-maid in a motherless home, whose love knows no sacrifice too great and whose loyalty endures in spite of ingratitude and unjust incriminations. Marie Dressler scores again as this pathetic and sturdy woman. It has been so well directed, it touches the emotions deeply, but has sufficient humor to appeal to the entire family.
