Girl Scout News

First Aid Course A first aid course is being given the Girl Scouts by Mr. Waite of the Chicago and Northwestern railway. This course is for the leaders of troops and for second class Girl Scouts who are twelve years of age and over and who are working on their first class work. The course will be ten weeks in length and will be held on Tuesday evenings in the junior department room in the Presbyterian church.

Swimming Much interest is being shown in the Girl Scout swimmers badge and a number of girls are working on it with Miss McClerman at the high school tank on Saturday mornings. Some of them have completed the requirements and are ready for their badge.

Even the cold weather does not keep the Girl Scouts from swimming. Several Girl Scouts and their leader, Mrs. Spriggs, hiked over from Deerfield last Saturday morning to go swimming with the Highland Park Girl Scouts.

The swimming period is from 10:30 until 11:15 each Saturday morning.

Camp Applications are now on hand for both Hickory Hill Girl Scout camp and for Timber Trail Girl Scout camp and may be had by any Girl Scout who meets the requirements of either camp.

Hickory Hill Girl Scout camp is owned and operated by the DesPlains Girl Scout council and is situated five miles from Edgerton, Wis., on Rice Lake. It is a deeply wooded spot on a small and private lake.

The camp is divided into four units. Each unit has developed different unit activities, history and varied unit traditions.

Rising Sun, one of the choicest spots in the camp, is the home of the youngest girl. Gypsies, is the encampment where the gypsies gather around the camp fire.

Indian Village, where live the Indians and their chief is to have special work in archery and basketry.

Hickory Harbor, the port of the Sea Scouts, and here are gathered all the oldest girls, advanced water sports and special canoeing classes are part of their program.

A competent staff of twenty counsellors will direct camp activities.

Red Cross life savers are in charge of the swimming program.

The following activities are part of the camp program: Swimming, beginning and advanced classes; Red Cross life saving; canoeing; woodcraft, pioneering, hiking, trailing, etc.; first class work; country dancing; dramatics; archery; signalling; nature, stars, flowers, trees, birds, insects, animals; handicrafts, leather, silverwork, weaving, wood carving; outdoor cooking; games.

Timber Trail, a pioneer camp for the older Girl Scouts of Chicago and the Great Lakes region, is located in the Hiawatha National Forest in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan about midway between Munising on Lake Superior and Nahma on Big Bay de Noc of Lake Michigan. The camp is situated on the first of a chain of lakes which connect with the Ten Waters of the

Big Indian, a river famous in logging days.

The three units, accommodating sixteen campers each, are placed some distance apart along the lake shore. A large log cabin provides a general meeting place. The tents are floored and contain cot beds and mattresses. Each unit is in reality a small camp by itself with its activities planned by the court of honor. All units have the same general canoeing and swimming periods. The girls prepare their meals, under the supervision of out-of-doors cooking councilors, in patrol kitchens constructed by the campers.

The surrounding country offers almost unlimited opportunities for exploring, whether afoot or in canoe of truck. The Pictured Rocks at Munising, together with many nearby waterfalls, may be visited during a daytime trip by truck while three day gypsy trips extend the possibilities of seeing more of the Lake Superior country. Nearby small lakes and rivers add to the fun of canoeing. Five lakes away from camp is our island, Tall Pine Shelter, where nights are spent on pine needle beds under the ceiling of stars, and the early call of the loons waken the campers to a trip of exploration down the Indian river. The "mighty Sturgeon" of Hiawatha fame is nearby and a three day trip by canoe over its rapids is an experience never to be forgotten.

Following are a few of the activities: folk dancing, nature activities, out of door cooking, Red Cross life saving, first class mapping, judging, natural handicrafts, sketching, cross country and wood craft games, photography, developing and printing, canoeing, canoe trips and canoe sailing, woodcraft, pioneering, hiking, tracking, singing, ballads, dramatics, story telling.

Timber Trail reunion will be held at the Chicago Girl Scout office on Saturday, March 26, at 10 a.m. A nosebag lunch will be served by the Timber Trail camp committee.

Brownie Pack No. 1 The Brownies of Pack No. 1 are now interested in planting and watching various things grow. They made lovely dish gardens which will be cared for at home and later shown at their flower show.

We finished by playing two games, one called "The Dug Out" and the other called "Bombing."

Pack No. 1 meets at Trinity Episcopal church each Thursday afternoon right after school.

After the investiture several games were played and the Pack went home through the Magic Tunnel.

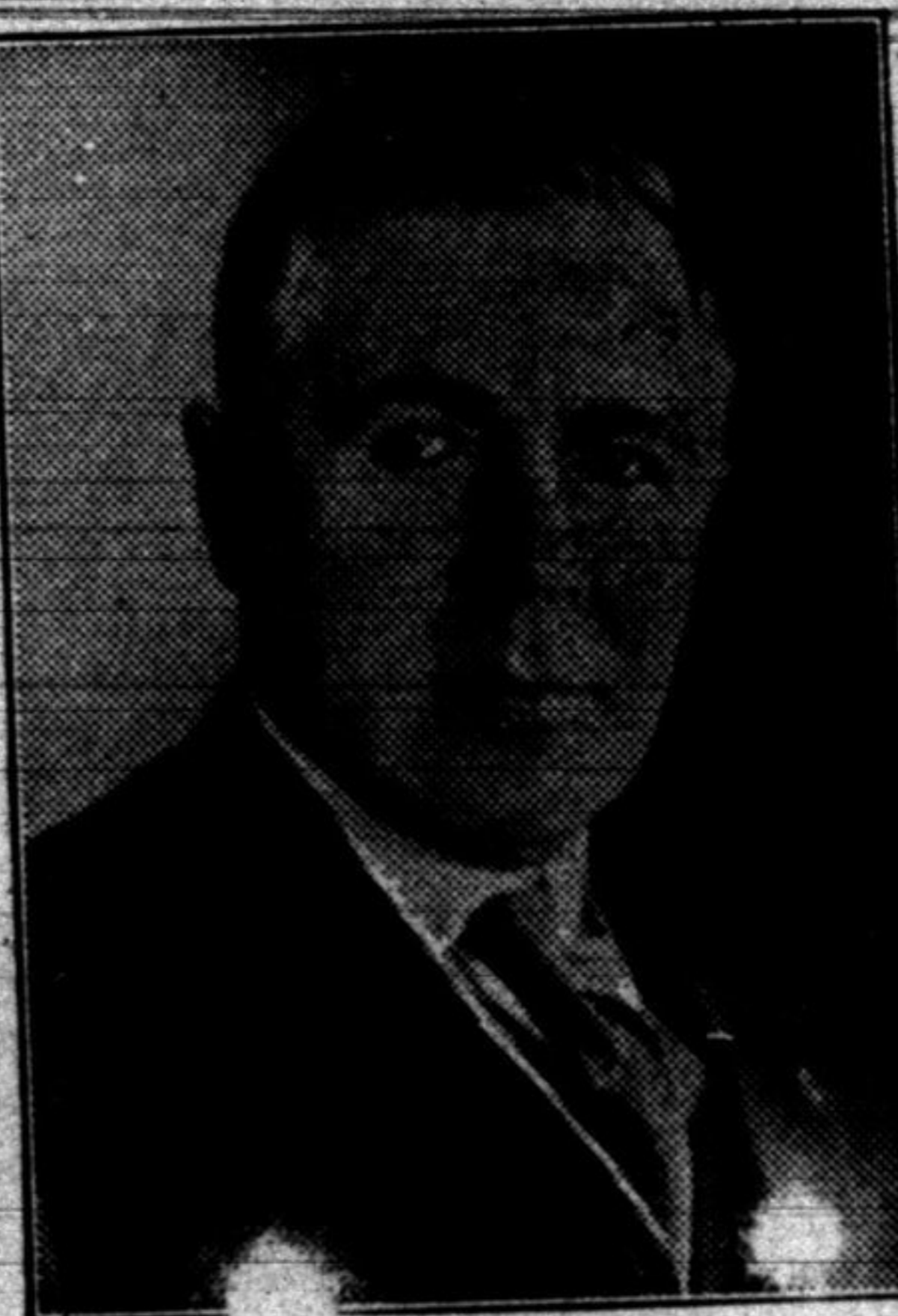
