#### Inspiring Account

The picture presents a dignified and inspiring account of the stirring period of Washington's life. Many individuals and organizations have co-operated actively in the preparation of the film, even to the loan of the same Bible by the St. Johns lodge of New York City, used in Washington's inaugural in 1789. The historical accuracy of the film has been checked by Dr. John C. Fitzpatrick, formerly in charge of the Manuscript division of the Library of Congress, and now engaged in the preparation of the life of Washington in twenty volumes.

Dr. Edgar Dawson, professor of history at Hunter college, New York City, collaborated with the editorial department in the preparation of the scenario.

The film is kept at the Highland Park Public library and reservations for its use may be made by calling Highland Park 312.

In order to keep these films in good condition for the use of the organizations and schools of the community, an inspection of the machine through which the film is to be shown is made, and the film re-wound and thoroughly cleaned after each usage. A service charge of one dollar is made to any school outside of the community for the use of these films, and three dollars for other organizations. All contributing organizations are to have free use of the films.
