Lake Co. Democratic Club Not to Endorse Any Individual, Claim

If any Democratic candidates entertained hopes of the indorsement of the Lake County Democratic club their plans were shattered last week when it was agreed that the club would boost the party as a whole and no individuals in the primary.

Attorney James G. Welch, one of the organizers of the club, balked the plans for an endorsement by declaring for strict neutrality on candidates, and a concentrated effort to get the Jeffersonian principles before the voters.

Practically all of the candidates spoke, with Judge Clarence N. Goodwin, of Lake Forest, presenting the platform of Judge Henry Horner for governor, and Joseph Daly, of Waukegan upholding the banner of Michael Igoe.

A. & P. Stores Sales for Four Weeks Is Reported; Is Decrease

Sales of the Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea company for the four week period ending February 27th were \$69,860,876. This compares with \$82,441,242 for the same period in 1931, and is a decrease of \$12,580,366, or 15.26 per cent.

February sales, expressed in tons, were estimated as 412,767 this year, compared with 439,545 in February, 1931. This is a decrease in quantity of merchandise sold of 26,778 tons or 6.09 per cent.

Average weekly sales in February were \$17,465,219, compared with \$20,610,311 in 1931, a decrease of \$3,145,092. Average weekly tonnage sales were 103,192 compared with 109,886 in February 1931, a decrease of 6.64.

Total sales for the fiscal year ending February 27, 1932, are estimated at \$1,008,000,000 as compared with \$1,065,806,885 for the year ending February 28, 1931, a decrease of 5.41 per cent.
