## SECOND WASHINGTON CELEBRATION HERE

### Is to Be Held April 29; Schools and Community Service To Co-operate

The special committee, appointed by the Highland Park representatives of the George Washington Bicentennial commission, to plan the second celebration to be given this year in Highland Park, has decided on Washington's Inaugural day as the occasion for this demonstration, instead of Patriots' day, as was planned at first. While Inauguration day falls on April 30, the Highland Park celebration will be on Friday afternoon, April 29, which was decided as a better time for the participation of the public schools.

This celebration will be put on by the local public schools in Highland Park in co-operation with Community Service of Highland Park, Inc., and features of the celebration will include pageantry, military and civic parades, Washington Inaugural exercises, climaxed by special demonstrations of a social and entertaining character at the Deerfield-Shields high school for the high school students and for the upper and lower grades in separate programs. The schools will be dismissed in order to take part in all the exercises of the afternoon. They will also take the responsibility for a great measure of the preparation including plans for costuming, preparation of floats, and music.

The special committee in charge of this celebration includes Mr. R. L. Sandwick, Mr. Clark G. Wright, Mr. Jesse L. Smith, Mrs. E. T. R. Murfey, and Mr. Harry L. Allen, director of recreation.

### Postpone Field Trip

On account of the heavy snow fall early this week it was necessary to postpone the first field trip of the season, under the auspices of Community Service of Highland Park, Inc., until Tuesday, March 29.

These interesting trips are lead by local people interested in nature guiding, including Mr. J. L. Smith and members of his school faculty, and have interested a great many local people of all ages.

On next Tuesday morning the group will meet at the lower shelter house at Sunset park at 6:30 a.m. and return in time for those who have to be back by 8:00. They will give special attention to the early spring migration of birds.

A series of these interesting field trips has been planned for the spring, and there will be one or two longer trips as the season advances.

### Easter Egg Hunt

The Lions club of Highland Park reports the purchase of 2500 candy eggs and the selection of a number of special prizes for the second annual Easter Egg hunt which occurs on Monday afternoon, March 28.

The Lions club will have a special committee from their own member-

ship to co-operate with Community Service of Highland Park in taking care of the hundreds of school children who will avail themselves of this interesting celebration.

Sunset park is again selected as the best place for holding the Easter Egg hunt and, as last year, the preschool, kindergarten, and first grade children will have their hunt separately at 3:30 p.m., while the second, third, and fourth grade children will arrive at the lower shelter house at Sunset park for their hunt at 4:00 p.m.

Children will be sent to the park under the supervision of their respective schools. Parents are requested to co-operate with the schools in providing transportation where necessary.

Members of the local Highland Park Boy Scout troops, under Myron C. Rybolt, will again give special assistance in handling the groups of children.

## Blizzard on Monday Impedes Traffic; City Streets Kept Open

Highland Park and Lake county were visited by the annual March blizzard Monday and by night roads in many places throughout the county were impassable. However, in Highland Park, the street department was able to keep streets open fairly well and no serious inconvenience was reported by motorists. County roads were still blocked in places Tuesday, but state and county road gangs were busy and by night most of the roads were open for traffic again. The storm was not so severe as that of a year ago, and there were fewer drifts, it was reported. No serious accidents nor damage was reported, although autos were stalled in drifts in many places throughout the county, road officials reported.
