## PRZYBORSKI COMES OUT FOR CARLSTROM

### Excerpt from Letter

Since my appointment as county manager, I received excellent response, co-operation and support from leaders of all sections of the county, all of whom have volunteered to devote the necessary time to perfect the best organization ever had in Lake county, even surpassing the one we had for Governor Emmerson four years ago and at this time with their aid, we have a Carlstrom organization perfected in all parts of the county and will have such an organization in each precinct within the next week. A good deal of credit for perfecting the Carlstrom organization is due to R. W. Churchill of Grays Lake, secretary of the Lake County Republican Central committee; Charles W. Kapschull, well-known Legionnaire of Deerfield; A. E. Smith, insurance broker of Highland Park; Mayor Walter L. Atkinson; Attorney Harold J. Tallett of North Chicago; Albert Hall, former president of the Lake County Bar association and corporation counsel of Waukegan; William R. Behanna, present corporation counsel of Waukegan; Oscar Soderquist, realtor of Waukegan and former president of the Lake County Real Estate Board, and many others.

I have consulted many precinct committeemen and candidates for that office and the majority of them volunteered their support for Carlstrom and from all appearances when the canvass is completed, I am satisfied that a great majority of the committeemen and candidates for that office, will be found in the Carlstrom organization.
