Deerfield C. of C. Hear Fine Talk on "Wills and Estates"

At the monthly meeting of the Deerfield Chamber of Commerce, held last Thursday evening, at Fehr's restaurant, the members present heard a very instructive and interesting illustrated talk on "Wills and Estates."

Harold R. Vant, of the firm of Vant & Selig, gave this talk which was his own idea of presenting this subject. Mr. Vant was formerly a photographer and knowing the advantages of pictures presented the entire talk with stereopticon slides. Mr. Vant went into detail from a layman's point of view of the steps necessary to take to probate a will; the disposition of an estate where no will is left; he explained in detail the advantages and disadvantages of real estate being held in Joint Tenancy and Tenancy in common; the points brought out regarding a joint bank account were also interesting, and last but not least the final portion of Mr. Vant's talk

dealt in the advantages of life insurance and a complete insurance program.
