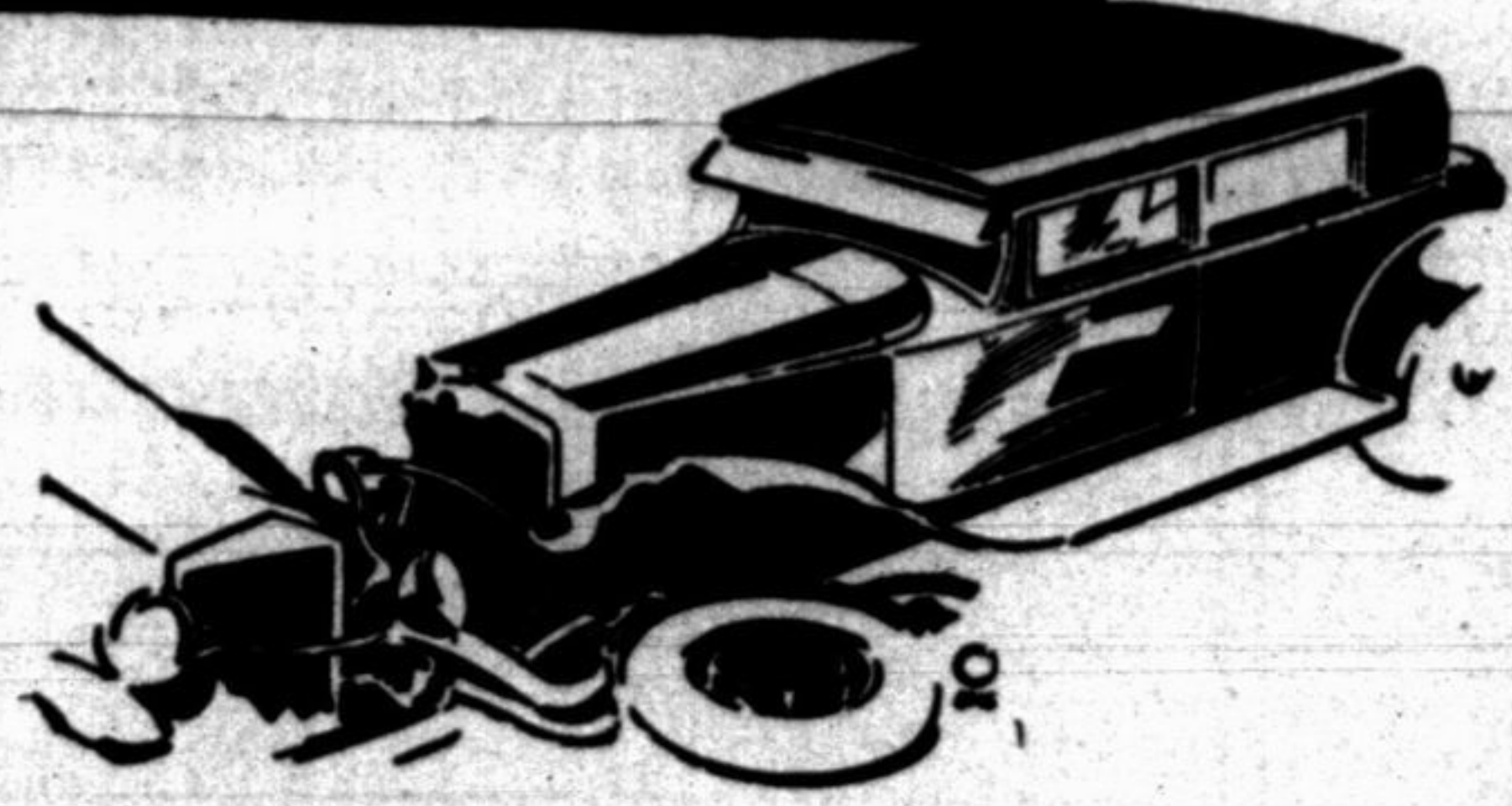

# Automobile Accident Toll--

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## Indians Beat Bearcats; Lights Lose to Ravens.

Playing a strong offensive game, the Highwood Indians heavies triumphed over the Wheeling Bearcats by a score of 31-25, Wednesday night at the Oak Terrace school gym. It was a hard fought game but the Indians lead was never threatened by the Bearcats.

In the first quarter England of the Indians started the scoring with a one hand shot from the foul line. He again followed with another basket on a tip off play. Scoring from the sidelines, Glandt of the Bearcats, lowered the Indians lead to two points and obtained the lead on baskets by Lawrence and Elwood. England tied the score with a long shot as the quarter ended.

After playing half of the second quarter, scoreless, the Indians acquired a lead on successive baskets by Maestri, who got 2. Grandt then scored one basket as the whistle for the half sounded.

Starting the third quarter with 3 free throws the Indians raised this lead to 12 points. Before the quarter ended Glandt scored 3 baskets to cut the Indian lead to just 5.

Trying to make a come-back like they did in the third quarter, the Bearcats scored 11 points only to have the Indians beat them by 9 points.

Playing one of the strongest teams in Lake county, the Highwood Indians lightweights were defeated by a score of 52-20. Although they tried to put up a hard battle it seemed impossible to beat the Ravens.

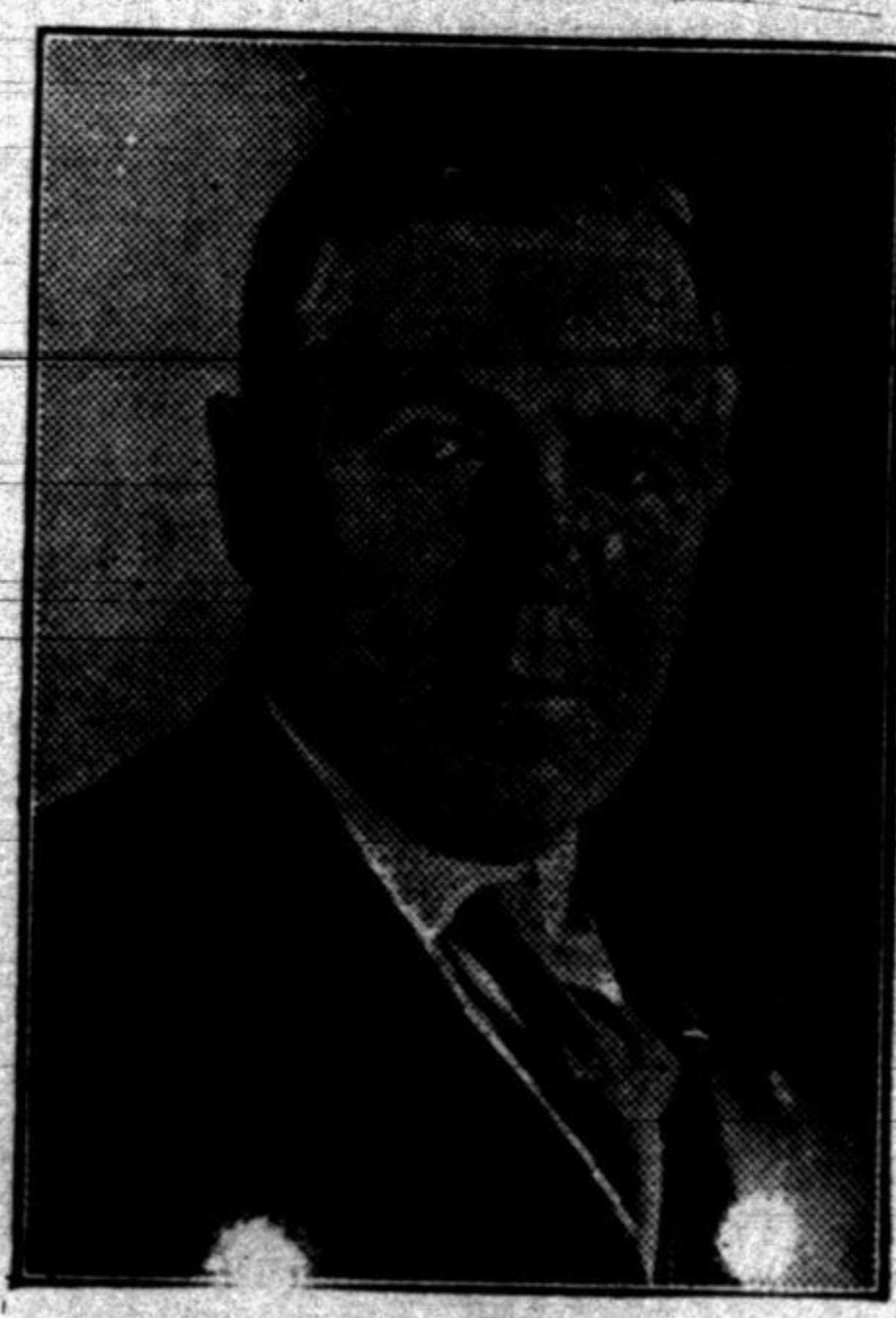
