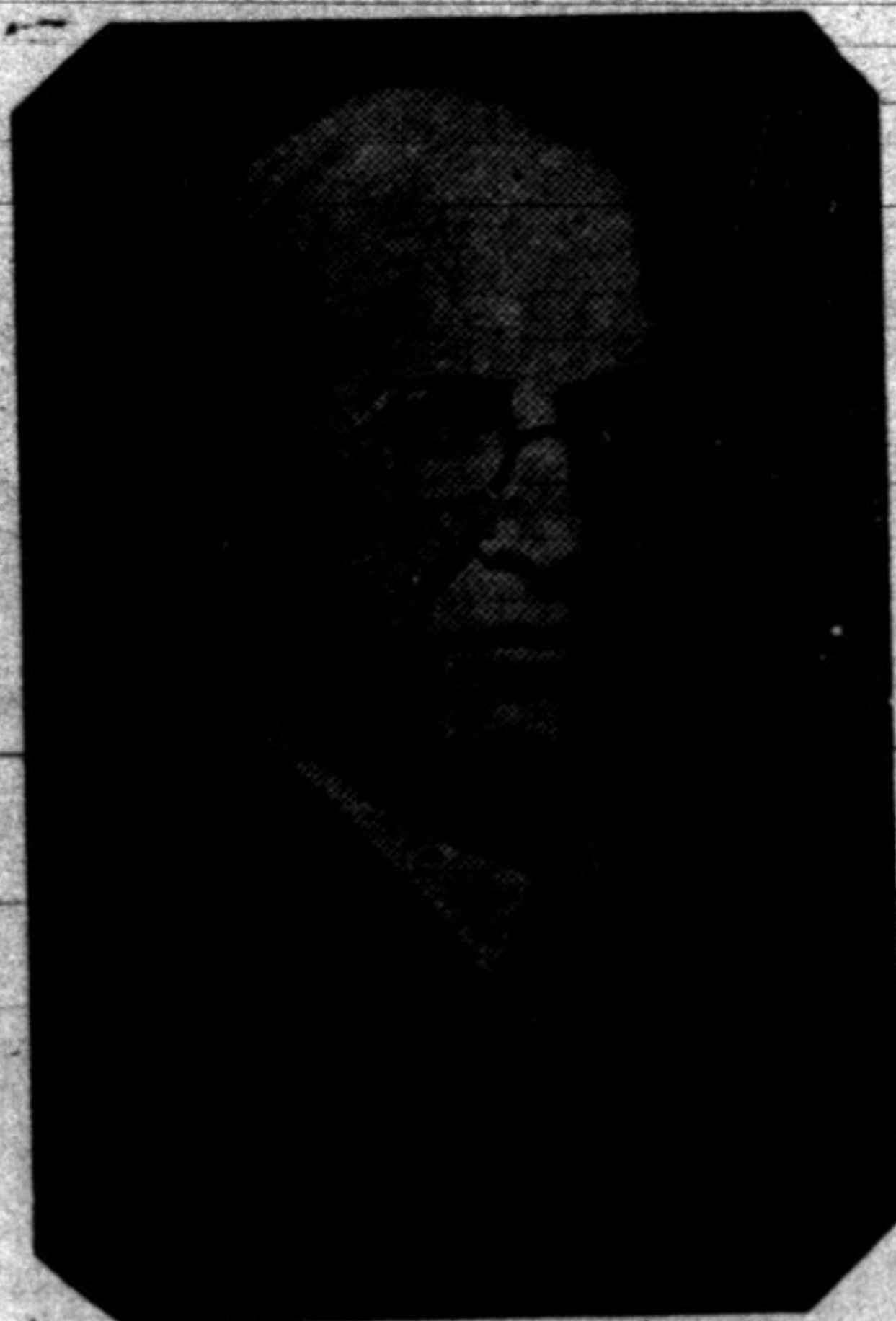

## TWO CONVENTIONS IN CHICAGO THIS JUNE

**Expected That They Will Bring 75,000 Visitors To City; Features Planned**

Approximately 75,000 persons will be brought to Chicago by the two national political conventions in June, according to estimates by Edward N. Hurley, chairman of the Nonpartisan Citizens committee.

Hurley said he expects a minimum of 25,000 visitors for the Republican national convention, opening June 14 at the Chicago Stadium, and about 50,000 for the Democratic gathering opening June 27.

The figures were based on attendance figures of past conventions, when five times the number of official visitors could be counted on as a minimum, with ten times as many being a possible maximum.

The delegate total for both conventions is the same—1,154. There will be an equal number of alternates and a large majority of the delegates and alternates will bring their families.

**Many Others to Come**  
Committeemen and committee-women for each state will be in attendance. There will be about 1,200 newspaper representatives, with space for 700 provided in the Stadium press stands. Nearly all of the members of both houses of Congress, as well as delegations from state legislatures, will be here.

Managers of the large hotels have reported more advance reservations than they had anticipated. However, they as yet do not care to give out exact figures.

The hotel men have just started to assign rooms, all the way from large rooms for candidate headquarters to the individual rooms for convention guests.

Hurley and his committee members are preparing an elastic entertainment program. Instead of having definite hours and days for excursions and inspections, the visitors will be asked to take advantage of a general entertainment program at their own convenience.

### Preview of Fair

A preview of the 1933 World's Fair is being arranged by Rufus C. Dawes, president of the exposition. A number of exhibits will be set up in the hall of science.

Mayor Cermak will send invitations to all delegates and alternates of both parties, and posters advertising the World's Fair preview will be placed in railroad stations throughout the country.

The citizens' committee is depending on excursion railroad fares to bring thousands of vacationers to Chicago, who will be attracted only incidentally by the conventions.

The slackest month the Waukegan construction industry has experienced in years is to be recorded for this March when the aggregate building volume will amount to only about \$500.

## Lake County Engineers Have Good Meeting and Hear Several Speakers

In a meeting termed the most successful in recent months, members of the Lake county unit of the Illinois Society of Engineers, last week heard addresses by two executives of the state organization at the county court house.

Approximately 75 members of the society, their wives, and friends gathered for the meeting to hear officials of the Illinois organization.

Professor H. E. Babbit, of the sanitation department at the University of Illinois, talked on "Modern Manchuria," a subject with which he is intimately acquainted from recent tours he made through the far east countries.

A second executive of the state group, H. J. Fixmer, spoke on problems common in the engineering field.

## Denies Insurance Co. Claim Against Bank

Circuit Judge Ralph J. Dady last week refused a claim of \$9,500 of the Western & Southern Insurance company against the Waukegan State bank.

The claim included one of the series of \$5,000 notes on the building that had fallen due, and interest of \$4,500 on the remainder of unpaid notes.

Judge Dady took the position that if he ordered the receiver to make the payment that it would be tantamount to a preferred claim for the insurance company.
