

Custer Promises to Take the Bunk Out of State Government

Promising to take the "bunk out of government and put it on a business basis," Omer N. Custer, Republican candidate for Governor, is conducting a whirl-wind campaign in Chicago this week. His manager, State Senator Harry G. Wright, declares that on the basis of down-state reports and the situation in Cook county, Custer will be nominated.

"One would think," Mr. Custer tells his Cook county audiences, "that the tremendous problems faced by the local governments of Cook county, which are unable to pay their employees or to meet their financial obligations, would be of sufficient importance to hold the center of the stage in this primary campaign. But for some reason or other this critical situation seems to have been forgotten in the clamor of false issues on the part of the very candidates who ought to be the most interested in finding a solution. Everything else, apparently seems to be of more importance to these candidates than the very obvious necessity for finding a way to relieve the overburdened taxpayers, who have defaulted on more than 140,000,000 of their taxes because they cannot sustain the overwhelming cost of local governments."

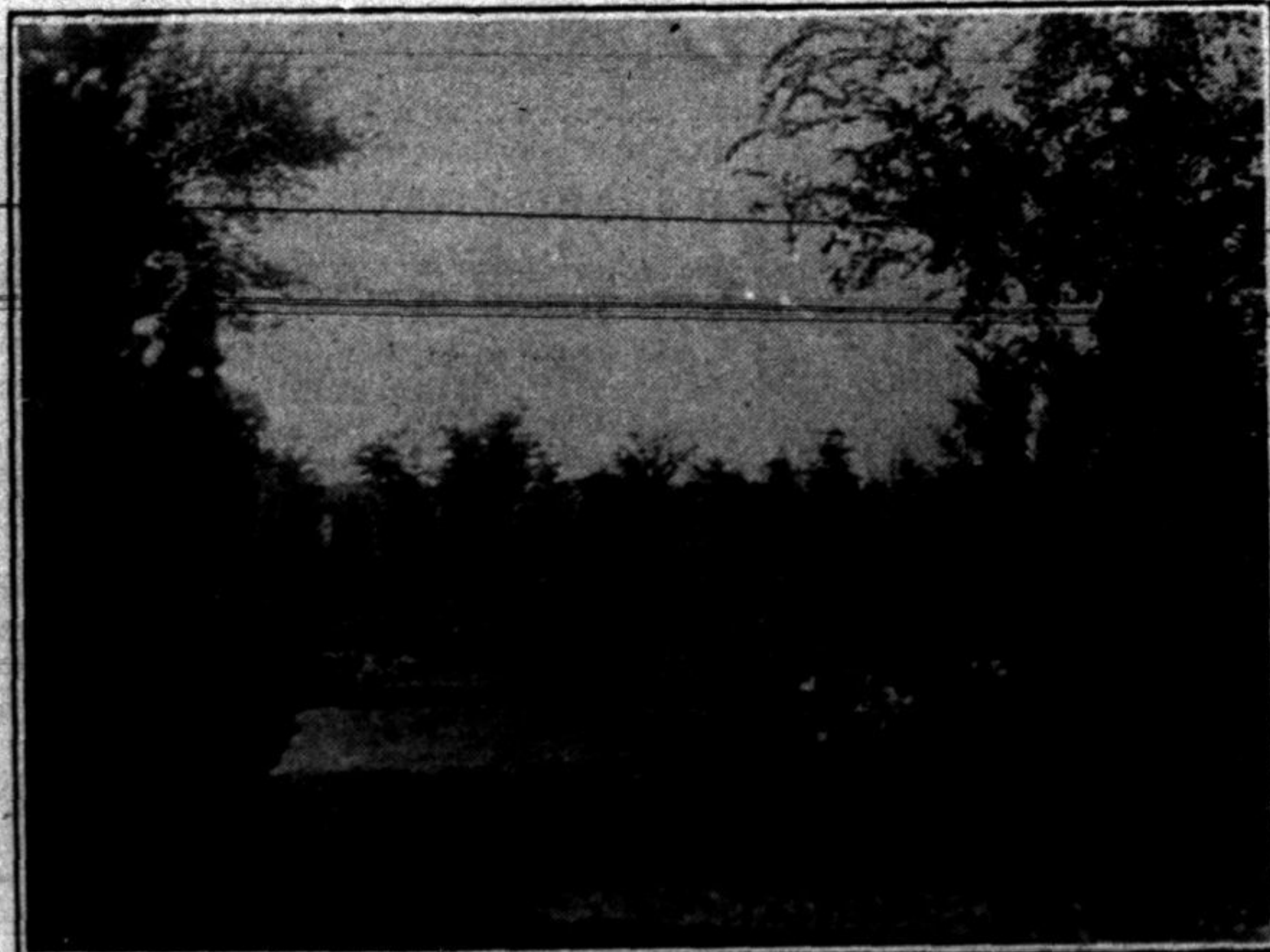
