## Lake County Firemen's Group Plan Zoning of County; Hold Meeting

The creation of fire zones throughout Lake county to bring about more efficient co-operation among the various departments in combating fires was discussed as a major topic before the Lake County Firemen's association at the monthly meeting held last week at Grayslake. This topic together with the plans discussed in several communities for extending fire protection beyond corporate limits is a major consideration of the firemen's group. The association, just recently organized, has in its membership firemen from 18 Lake county departments and is expected to represent every force when fully organized.

### Committee Named

A committee appointed by President Huber to investigate feasibility of laying out fire zones includes the following: Chief C. E. Hoskins, of Highland Park; Chief Charles Berger, of Fox Lake; Glen Craft, of Grayslake; A. C. Sorensen, Wauconda; Chief Ed. Schneider, Libertyville; Chief James Stearns, Antioch; and A. A. Meyer, of Lake Bluff.

Secretary John Horan, of the Antioch department, and Chief Hoskins of Highland Park, were named as a committee to set up a program along educational lines concerning fire fighting and fire prevention work. The next regular meeting of the association scheduled for April 25 and just prior to the annual election of officers is to be held at Wauconda, it was announced.

Senator Ray Paddock, of Wauconda, spoke briefly on the association and outlined a number of benefits to be derived through co-operation of several departments.

## Fellowship of Faiths Meeting at Evanston Sunday Eve., April 10

Money will be discussed—for the raising of funds but the philosophical, religious question; "Shall Man or Money Be Master?"—at Evanston's First Congregational church, Hinman ave. and Lake st., Sunday evening, April 10, beginning at exactly 7:30 p.m. "Six Faiths, in Fellowship" are to be represented. For Protestant Christianity the spokesman is Professor Fred Eastman, professor of religious literature and drama at Chicago Theological seminary who has recently attacked the commercializing of movies. Judge John P. McGoorty, of the Superior Court of Cook county, speaks as a Roman Catholic Christian. The Rev. Harold M. Kingsley, D.D., director of Negro work of the Congregational Church Extension Boards, speaks as a Negro Christian. Avis Clamitz Shulman, wife of Rabbi Shulman of Glencoe and herself trained by the chief American seminary for Jewish rabbis, will interpret Judaism's answer to the "Money" question. Mohammedanism is to be represented by Sufi Mutiur Ralman Ben galee, the one, and only, Moslem missionary to America from the Ahmadiyah Movement in Islam. Mahatma Gandhi's Hinduism is to be presented by David Malaiperuman, of Medras, India. The Rev. Hugh Elmer Brown, pastor of the First Congregational church of Evanston, presides. Professor James A. Yard, of Northwestern university, serves as time monitor—holding every speaker to the fixed twelve minute limit.

The North Shore Fellowship of Faiths, who present this unique meeting, includes all the communities from Evanston to Highland Park and Lake Forest. The Rev. Ernest Fremont Tittle, D.D., of Evanston, is chairman and Rabbi Charles E. Shulman, of Glencoe, vice chairman. They head the North Shore committee of 100 comprising widely representative men and women of all the suburbs north of Chicago.
