CHINDBLOM, SMITH LOSE IN PRIMARY

**Simpson Wins for Congress and
Mason for Prosecutor;
Vote in Detail**

All political dope sheets were sent to the waste basket when the results of Tuesday's primary election in the county and 10th congressional district were reviewed Wednesday afternoon from the final unofficial figures.

Cong. Chindblom, who carried Lake county, with a total of 7,319 lost the congressional nomination to James Simpson, Jr., who, at Press time, appears to be only several hundred votes ahead of Ralph Church, according to unofficial returns.

Mason Beats Smith

Perhaps the outstanding feature of the primary in Lake county was the defeat of States Attorney A. V. Smith by Charles E. Mason, who won by a plurality of 326 votes, despite the fact that Voliva's block of 2,000 or more votes in Zion were given to Smith.

The race for the new office of county auditor was an exciting one, Otto Sarvella leading in the early returns and until almost the last returns were in, when Pearsall jumped into the lead and finished with a plurality of about 650 votes. The total vote in the county was: Pearsall, 7,968; Sarvella, 7,285; Abercromby, 1,983. The other candidates polled small votes.

Dr. J. L. Taylor, coroner for 30 years, was nominated for re-election to that office. It was a close race until about midnight Tuesday night, when Taylor showed his strength and pulled ahead. The final unofficial returns were:

Candidates Elected Without Opposition At School Elections

At the annual school elections held last Saturday afternoon all candidates were elected as previously indicated, without opposition.

In the Deerfield-Shields high school district George T. Rogers of Lake Forest was re-elected member of the board for the three-year term with a total of 266 votes, according to the unofficial count. The board met last night to reorganize for the ensuing year with election of president and secretary.

In Dist. 107 Mrs. Frances Creigh and Dr. Gatewood were re-elected members of the board for three years, and Howell Murray was re-elected president of the board for one year, the term of that office.

In District 108, Delmar M. Blasier and Mr. Geo. W. Carr were each re-elected for a term of three years. To succeed Mr. Carelton M. Vail, who has so ably served as president of the board of education. Mr. Robert L. Grinnell was elected to the office of president for the term of one year. Mr. Grinnell is a graduate of Yale university, a lawyer, and an official of the Union Trust and Savings bank in Chicago. He has been a resident of Highland Park for seven years and has two children in school, one in Ravinia school and one in high school.

**More Than Hundred on Course
Last Sunday; Greens in
Fine Condition**

Despite unseasonable weather, more than 100 golfers were out over the week-end at Sunset Valley last Saturday and Sunday.

The course is in excellent condition, particularly the greens, which show the expert care given them during the winter under the direction of Tom Kelly. It is doubtful if any course in the district can boast better greens at the present time.

The membership committee has launched a drive for new members, and for the first time is accepting partial payments. Until May 15 all applicants who so desire may pay ten dollars of their dues, and arrange to pay the balance at their convenience within sixty days.

The club house, during the winter, was greatly improved, and promises to be one of the most popular spots in Highland Park for bridge, afternoon teas, and other gatherings. The restaurant is now equipped to dispense ice cream, and will serve only the popular Witty cream.
