### School Election Is Most Exciting Held in Several Years

Two hundred fifty ballots were cast at the Deerfield Grammar school election, last Saturday afternoon, for the three candidates, William J. Galloway, Daniel Hunt, and Alexander Taylor, in one of the most exciting and closest elections held in the grammar school in a great many years. William Galloway, who has served on the board for a number of years was re-elected by a small margin. Had the candidates declared themselves sooner, even a larger vote would have been polled. Evidence of dissatisfaction with the present school regime is shown in the fact that the winning candidate received 93 votes, while his opponents received 156 votes. One ballot was thrown out because it was marked incorrectly.

Following is the vote: William Galloway, 93; Daniel Hunt, 80; Alexander Taylor, 76.

On the same day, the town hall was open for the election of one member of the Deerfield-Shields high school board of education and for a township school trustee. George T. Rogers, candidate for re-election for the high school board, and Peter J. Duffy, also a candidate for re-election for township school trustee, were both unopposed, although seven names were written in, several thinking that the town hall was where the grade school election was being held. 52 votes were cast in the high school ballot box and 36 in the township box, with a number of scratched ballots in both sections.

The high school results were: George Rogers, 46; William Seiler, 1; Daniel S. Hunt, 1; Harry Paul, 1; C. W. Boyle, 1.

The township: Peter J. Duffy, 32; William J. Galloway, 1; Alexander Taylor, 1; Daniel Hunt, 1.

The results of the high school election for the entire district were as follows:

Lake Forest, 58; Highwood, 66; Highland Park, 9; Deerfield, 46—Total 265 votes for George Rogers.
