Children Here Have No Idle Money, Report

President Hoover's campaign to put idle dollars to work is taken seriously by a great portion of the public school population of Highland Park.

The youngsters are heavy bankers in the school savings bank. As a result, they have succeeded in having the name of this city posted on the latest Thrift Honor roll, just published by Thrift, Inc., school savings headquarters, Oak Park, Chicago, Ill.

The Thrift Honor roll appears in the latest issue of the Thrift Almanack, a magazine devoted to the subject of thrift education. It is distributed to local teachers through courtesy of the Highland Park State bank which co-operates with the board of education in sponsoring the local thrift education program.

ett, from Harlan county, Ky., and a Negro. The gathering was held under sponsorship of the Chicago Students' league.

"Haessler asserted that the next war involving the United States will find a group of men who will, at the opportune time, 'overthrow the existing order'."

Delegates from the Chicago Students' league were among those recently ousted, as Communists, from Kentucky.

The United States Government Report on Communism (No. 2290) says: "The Federated Press organized in 1918" (right after the Russian Revolution) "aims to furnish information to the radical press of the country including the communist newspapers. Its main clients are either advanced socialists papers, radical-labor units or communist or other revolutionary papers. . . . It has received approximately \$5,000 annually from the Garland Fund." On Page 59 of this report are cited other large donations from the Garland Fund to such Communist activities as Communist-inspired strikes, Communist newspapers, the Communist Moscow-controlled International Labor Defense, etc. Concerning the Federated Press, the report contains this testimony: "The soviets maintain a monopoly of news both for domestic consumption and for export, just as they maintain monopolies in every other practical direction. The agency which exports and imports news for the soviets is the Telegraph agency of the Soviet union." The report adds that the Washington, D.C., office and personal representative of the Soviet Union Telegraph Agency and of the Federated Press are one and the same.

The definition of Communism given in this official Government Report is: "A world-wide political organization advocating: 1) Hatred of God and all forms of religion; 2) destruction of private property and inheritance; 3) absolute social and racial equality; promotion of class hatred; 4) revolutionary propaganda through the Communist International; 5) destruction of all forms of representative or democratic governments, including civil liberties, such as freedom of speech, of the press, of assembly, and trial by jury; 6) the ultimate and final objective is by means if world revolution to establish the dictatorship of the so-called proletariat into one world union of soviet socialist republics with the capital at Moscow."
