

COUNCIL URGES FORT ROAD BE COMPLETE

Adopts Resolution Addressed to State Dept. of Pub. Works; Other Business

At the regular meeting of the city council Monday evening a resolution was adopted urging the state department of public works to proceed as soon as possible with the improvement of Sheridan road through Fort Sheridan. The resolution points out that bids were received for this work some time ago and that all Highland Park residents are vitally interested in the completion of this work.

Reports of the building, water and police departments were received and filed. The report of Police Magistrate Schwery was approved showing fines to April 1 totaling \$304.

A communication from H. B. Roberts with reference to the use of the parkway in front of his property was referred to the Street Department.

CASPER SANTI CASE IS FINALLY SETTLED

U. S. Dist. Court Approves Agreement Providing Full Payment

The involved affairs of Casper Santi, upset by last summer's bankruptcy proceedings, have been settled through a composition agreement whereby all Santi's property has been turned over to a liquidating trustee who will issue beneficial certificates to each of Santi's creditors for the full amount of their claims.

Victor Colombini, a prominent Highwood merchant, has accepted the duties of trust and has assumed full control of the many properties and financial interests of Casper Santi. He will be materially assisted in his efforts by Santi and a committee of six, composed of Frank Scornavacca, Peter Guerrini, Frank Caretta, Serafino Morelli, Frank Zagnoli and Angelo Ori, all citizens of Highwood and well-known and respected by their countrymen in that city.

Assets Turned Over

The assets which have been turned over to Colombini consist of real estate, land contracts, houses, mortgages, stocks and bonds, notes and open accounts. The largest item among the assets is a one-half interest in the Santi building, which is a large office and store building located in the center of the Highwood business district.

There are over four hundred creditors of Santi with claims ranging from small two and three dollar accounts to loans as large as twelve thousand dollars. He occupied a position. (Continued on page 32)
