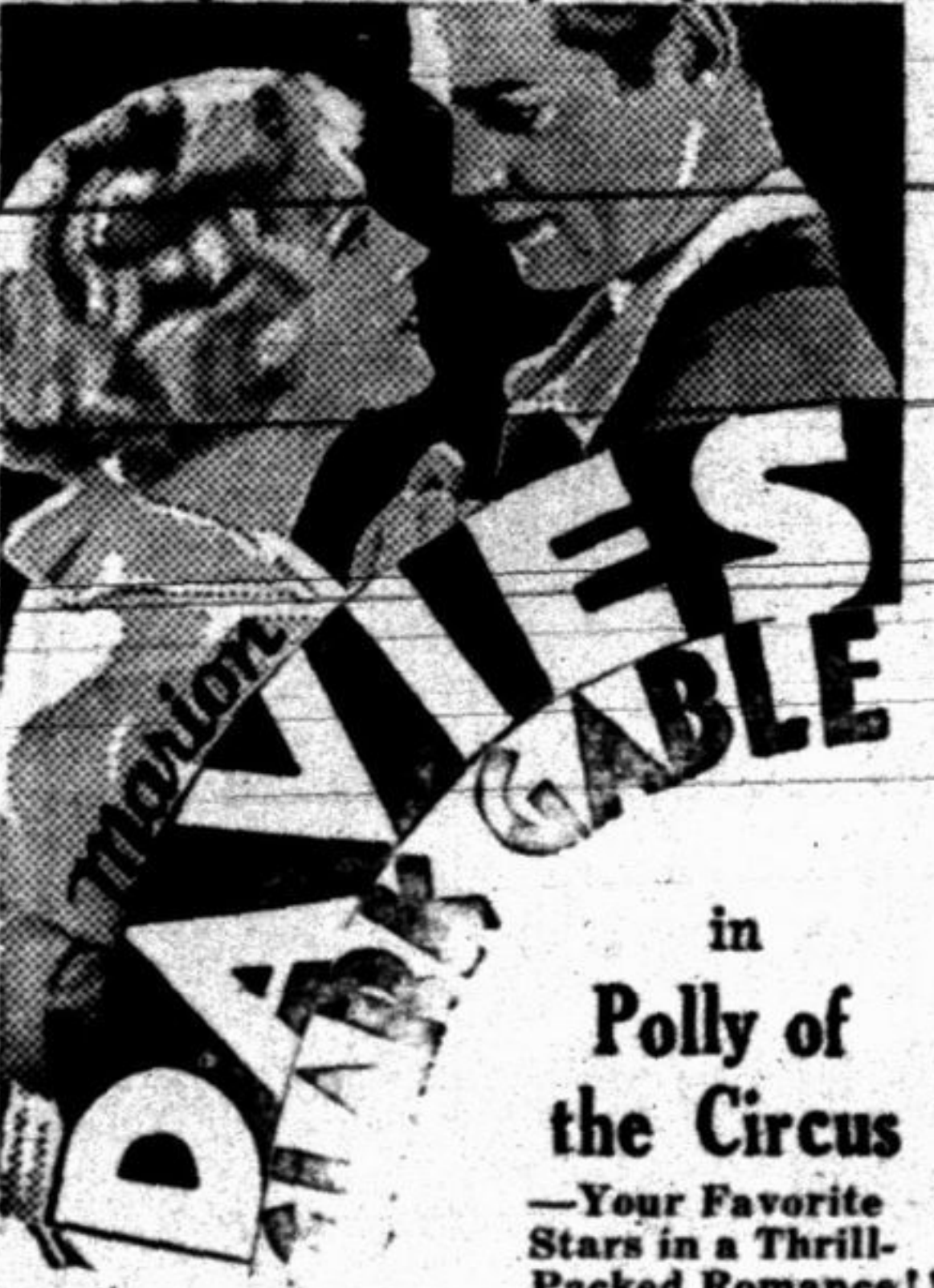

CUBS ARE GROWING, CHAIRMAN ASSERTS

Head of North Shore Area Program Reports Marked Progress in Work

Dr. C. V. Nichols, chairman of the Cub program for the North Shore Area council, Boy Scouts of America, reports there is such an interest in the new "Cub" program that it seems advisable to again inform the public just what is definitely meant by "Cubbing." To answer these inquiries the following is submitted:

Cubbing Program

"Today, after years of experiment by hundreds of leaders, and after scientific research financed by the Laura Spellman Rockefeller Memorial, the Boy Scouts of America is meeting a growing demand of the age—a program of home-centered activities for boys of pre-Scout years.

The activities are suited to the age and interests of the boys. The "Den" is a natural, neighborhood play-group. One of the mothers called the "Den Mother" gives interested oversight. A "Den Chief," an older Scout, meets the "Cubs" once a week—he comes to meet them where they play. The "Pack," with its man "Cubmaster," consists of several Dens. The Pack's chief business is to help the Dens. The Den's chief business is to help the Dens. The Den's chief business is to provide activities, and encouragement for it boys.

Cubs enter at nine ("Wolf" year), pass on at 10 into "Bear" year, at 11 into "Lion" year and at 12 graduate into Scouting.

His Happiness — as a helpful young citizen, "doing his best," acquiring experience, bearing responsibility, thus contributing to

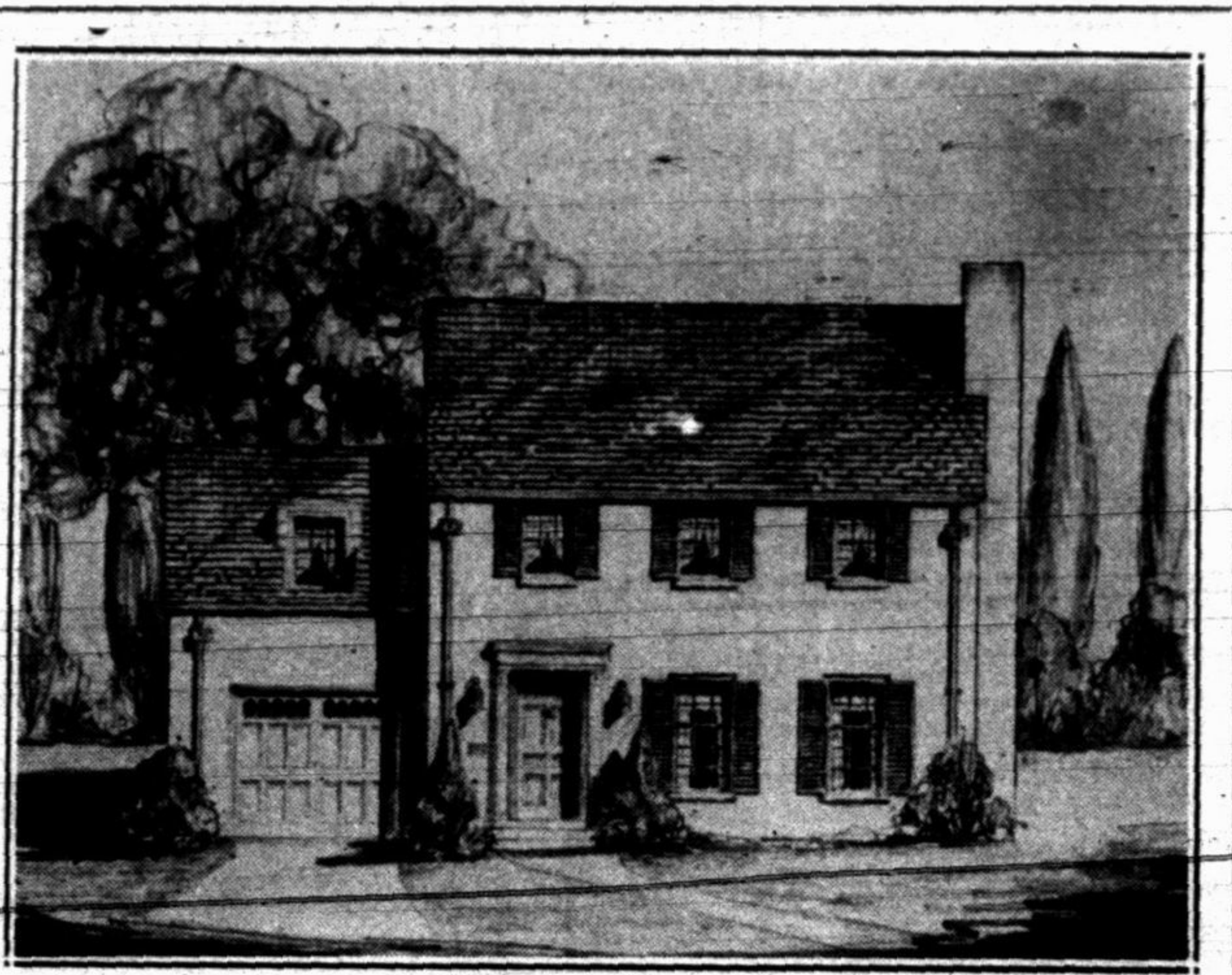
