

H. S. GRADUATES IN COLLEGE MAKE GOOD

Former Deerfield Students Are Winning Distinction in Advanced Schools

The graduates of the Deerfield-Shields high school are winning distinction for their school by superior work in college and university. During the first semester of the present year they received twice as many semester hours of A in their subjects in college as would reasonably have been expected according to the normal distribution of grades, Principal R. L. Sandwick reports.

The following statistics are based upon reports of the freshmen class which were sent by the colleges to the principal of the high school at the end of the first semester, 1931-'32. Unfortunately, as some colleges do not make such reports, the data is only 80% complete. The records of fifty-one students were studied. Of the 771 semester hours of work for which they were enrolled, 15% were given a grade of

How is the assessor chosen?

What is his salary?

Does his office maintain suitable card records?

Are there unit foot values recorded on land maps?

Does his office have uniform business, riparian, etc. values?

Does his office have uniform improvement value?

Upon what basis does he levy assessment?

How many protests did he have when lists were published?

How many appeals were made?

What is total valuation in 1930?

1931?

What is the increase?

DEERFIELD HIGH IS ACCREDITED SCHOOL

Given High Ranking by North Central Association; Advantages

Mr. R. L. Sandwick, Sup't of the Deerfield - Shields township high school, has just been notified that this school has been accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary schools for the period ending March 17, 1933.

In explanation of the term of accrediting the local school authorities have been advised that it is the established policy of the association to prepare each year a new list of approved secondary schools accorded this honor and that no school is accredited by the North Central association for a period longer than one year. Deerfield-Shields has been accredited every year continuously since 1906, a period of twenty-four years.

On Highest List

Before any school can be considered for accrediting by the North Central association it must be on the highest list of schools approved and accredited by the school authorities of this state. In addition it must meet the high standards which the association maintains with respect to the school building and its equipment, the school library, laboratories and instructional equipment and apparatus, school records, laboratories and instructional equipment and apparatus, school records, (Continued on page 21)

Women Badly Hurt in Accident Monday

The noise startled the occupants, and Mrs. W. F. Ross, the driver, turned to see what it was, lost control of the car, driving over the curb and up the embankment into a tree.

Mrs. Ross had two teeth knocked out and her mouth was badly cut. Mrs. Richardson suffered a broken wrist and Mrs. A. S. Burdick a broken right arm. Mrs. B. M. Person was the least injured, receiving only bruises and cuts. All are reported as getting along nicely now.
