Shields and Deerfield Towns in Fifth Dist. in County Fire Zones

The districting of Lake county into five distinct fire zones, a move fostered by the recently organized County Firemen's association in order to give a more efficient fire pro- tection to every district, was ap- proved by the association at a meet- ing held Monday night in Wauconda.

District number one including Antioch, Fox Lake, Grayslake and Round Lake is to have five pumpers at its disposal.

District number two with Liberty- ville, Mundelein, Grayslake and Wauconda is to have five pumpers and adequate man-power.

The third district includes Wau-

conda, Barrington, Long Grove, Lake Zurich and Mundelein while the fourth division will include Zion, Burnee, Waukegan, North-Chicago, and Great Lakes.

The fifth and last district com- prises Lake Bluff, Lake Forest, Highwood, Highland Park and Deer- field.

Copies of the resolution designat- ing the new fire zones are to be dis- tributed to each of the eighteen de- partments of Lake county holding memberships in the Firemen's asso- ciation.

Speakers at the meeting Monday night included Frank C. McAuliffe, chief of patrols of the Chicago Fire Insurance patrol; R. W. Hosmer, president of the Illinois Insurance Agents association; and Rev. John Coleman, a former Chicago fire de- partment chaplain.
