Each year the various taxing bodies, hand in their tax levy ordinance to the county clerk. This is generally compiled in the spring but it must be in by September 5 each year.

Previous to this the township assessor hands over his tax books containing every parcel of real estate to the county clerk. The assessment roll is then handed to the Board of Review. This is the time, if any, when complaints should be made in regard to one's taxes. The Board of Review holds the records for several months, when they are eventually approved and handed over to

the county clerk. The rest of the

work is clerical, making out the tax bills and mailing them.


