The Highland Park hospital will be "at home" to the entire community from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Thursday of next week — National Hospital day—May 12.

The staff of the hospital and board of directors have issued a cordial invitation to all men, women and children in Highland Park, Ravinia, Deerfield and Glencoe to visit the hospital on that day.

The Dental clinic will be on view as well as many other facilities. The Infant Feeding clinic and nursery will attract many mothers. Extensive laboratory and X-ray departments will interest the curious as well as the scientific.

Students to Visit

Several hundred high school students will be taken in groups to the hospital so they may see the practical and humanitarian application of their chemistry and physics studies.

The newly decorated "Sun Room" will be a surprise to many visitors in its spaciousness and beauty, as well as the many attractive private rooms and wards.

The Woman's Auxiliary are planning to make all at home with the assistance of the nursing staff, and tea will be served from 3 to 6 o'clock.

"The unusual combination of educational and social activities" said Miss Ibsen, superintendent of the hospital, "will acquaint many new residents with the splendid facilities of the hospital, and remind our friends of the value and constant usefulness of the hospital to the entire community."

TAX PAYERS

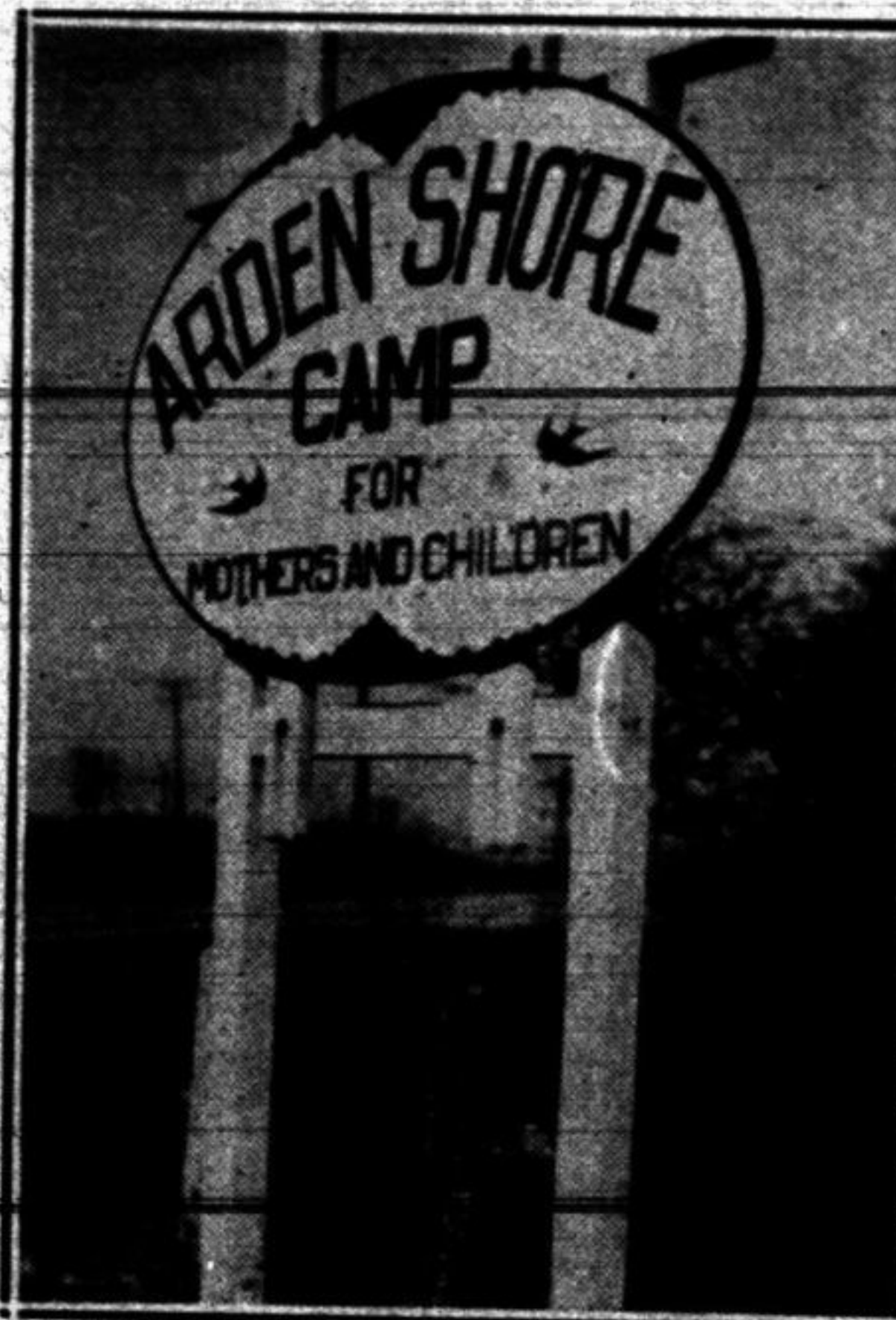
The League of Women Voters has invited Mr. Martin Ringdahl, assessor of this township to meet with members of the league and all citizens of the community who are interested in the present tax question.
